RETURN HOME

San Francisco, March 8.—The Steamship arrived this morning from the Orient and brought General Corbin who is returning from duty in the Philippines.

Corbin said: "If we are to have missionaries in China we must have troops to protect them. The recent rioting was committed by river pirates, and although trouble is bound to come in the Orient I anticipate nothing of a warlike nature. There is absolutely no foundation for sensational reports of war in China and the boycott on American goods is rapidly adjusting itself and is now practically stopped."

"It was at my request that troops were hurried to the Philippines in anticipation of trouble in China. It is better to be prepared for all emergencies, this country taking no chances. All the great powers have troops in the celestial kingdom and there is no reason why we should not. Troops prevent trouble, not foment it. There is no foundation for the statement that Japan desires to become owner of the Philippines."

"China is making no effort to protect the lives or property of foreigners, notwithstanding the general distrust of the people against missionaries. The feeling is as intense against the Germans and English as against Americans."

Regarding the condition of the Philippines Corbin stated that it had never been better.
