F. L. Skaggs Dead

This morning T. G. Hendricks received the sad announcement by letter from his sister, Mrs. Skaggs, at Oakland, California, that her son, F. L. Skaggs, "Lafe," as he was better known here, died at Pleasanton, forty miles from San Francisco, Monday, March 5, of pneumonia. He had gone there on business about a hotel in which he was interested when he was stricken. The burial was to take place in a San Francisco cemetery.

"Lafe" was born in Lane county, and was about 36 years of age. He grew up and received his education in Eugene and learned telegraphy at the Eugene depot, becoming a very proficient operator. He was afterward employed in the Portland railroad offices several years. He married in San Francisco, and leaves a wife and two little girls.

This death fills the cup of sorrow of his mother to overflowing—he was the last of five children. She will likely return to Eugene to reside.
