RAILROAD BRIDGE WILL REMAIN

County Court Allows S. P. Company's Trestle Across Road

Grants Company Right to Cross the Thoroughfare Providing It Maintains a Light on Each Side of Trestle

The county court yesterday afternoon made an official order as follows: In the matter of the application of the Southern Pacific Co. for a right to construct its railroad track across county road No. 95. This matter came to be heard upon the 12th day of March, 1906, on the application of the Southern Pacific Co. asking for the right to construct its railroad track across county road No. 95, west of Springfield, in Lane county, Oregon. And it appearing that said track heretofore been laid and constructed across said county road, it is therefore ordered and adjudged that said Southern Pacific Co. is hereby granted the right to construct its said track across said county road at the point where said track is now located and constructed, provided said company shall not construct nor maintain any obstructions in said county

road that will interfere with the use of said county road as a public highway and county road. And said company shall, at its own expense, keep said road in good repair and condition where said railroad track crosses the same. And provided further that said company shall, at its own expense, maintain during the night time one light at each end of the bents on the middle row of piling as the same are now placed across the road, said lights not to be less than 45-candlepower. I said company shall fail to keep and perform any of said conditions then in that event this order and grant shall be at an end and of no force or effect.

FINE NEW DEPOT THIS SUMMER

The Guard learned last evening from a railroad man that Superintendent Fields, of the Southern Pacific Company, had informed him that the long-contemplated and much-talked-of new passenger depot for Eugene would be built early this summer. It is understood that it will be about twice as large as the present one. It will be located where S. H. Friendly's warehouse now stands and the freight depot will be located just west of the new passenger depot. When the new building is completed there will be no more delays by freight trains standing on the sidetracks. The two big warehouses on the south side of the tracks will be moved to the north side, as stated by the Guard many times.
