ROWLAND JURY FAILS TO AGREE

Another Trial Will Be Held at the June Term of Court

Eleven Stand for Conviction and One for Acquittal--Jury Discharged After Being Out Over Sixteen Hours

The jury in the Virgil Rowland adultery case, after having been out over sixteen hours, this morning at 8:30 o'clock reported to Judge Harris that they were unable to agree upon a verdict and were discharged. It is said that upon the first ballot taken by the jury the vote stood nine for conviction and three for acquittal. The next ballot and each succeeding one stood eleven for conviction and one for acquittal. It is said that Ben Lyons was the one in favor of acquittal. The other jurors were: T. A. Shafer, Jno. F. Weeks, R. Y. Porter, Samuel Calkins, E. E. Awbrey, J. M. Holland, Chas. Fowler, Ross Houston, C. M. Hales, Wm. Mathers and H. Bjerkle.

After the jury had made its report and was discharged an order was made for another trial on the first day of the next regular term of court in June.

THE OTHER CASES.

The trial of Howard Farlow, charged with giving liquor to a minor, was set for Tuesday of the first week of the June term.

In the cases of Ruby Miller, charged with lewd cohabitation, and Walter Foley, charged with manslaughter, demurrers to the indictments were argued this morning and taken under advisement.

Court adjourned this afternoon till Friday morning, March 16, at 9 a. m. Before adjournment the following allowances were ordered: J. M. Howe, grand jury bailiff, \$27; Ciny Zunwald, trial jury bailiff, \$24; Frank Armistage, court bailiff, \$24; S. M. Calkins, court reporter, \$20; reporting testimony for district attorney, \$2; G. F. Skipworth, attorney for Oscar Corder, \$10; Emma D. Thompson, reporting in cases of Eddy, Cavelor and Fitzer, \$25.

TAKE OUT FOR UNITED STATES SENATOR

I believe the public service corporations should be subject to governmental regulations and control. The power of regulation should be vested in the Interstate Commerce Commission and should be exercised with due regard to the respective rights of the people and the corporation.

Trusts or combinations of capital organized for the purpose of controlling the utilities and necessities of the country, to the exclusion of legitimate competition, are contrary to public policy, in derogation to the rights of the people, and should come under the ban of the law.

I believe in preserving the dignity of our American citizenship and the freedom of the laboring classes of this country, hence I am opposed to the admission of the Chinese coolie labor of China and the undesirable classes of continental Europe.

The growing commerce of Oregon demands the deepening of the bar of the Columbia river, the construction of The Dalles-Celilo canal, the opening of the upper Columbia, the improvement of Coos Bay, Tillamook and Yaquina harbors, the dredging of the Willamette and the government ownership of the locks at Oregon City and Federal appropriations should be made, securing these improvements.

A tariff should be maintained for the protection of American industries and American labor. Where, however, the necessity for protection is removed by the growth and development of a particular industry, the tariff should be modified to meet the changed conditions.

The reclamation of the arid lands is one of the pressing needs of the Northwest, and a condition necessary to its development, and the efficiency of the reclamation service should be one of the first cares of the Federal government.

The Federal constitution should be amended to provide for the election of United States senators by direct vote of the people, and I am in favor of the establishment of the parcels post.

COMPANY HELD LIABLE FOR DAMAGES

Opinion by City Attorney L. E. Bean on the Water Question

City Council Holds Exciting and Lengthy Meeting--Arc Light Question Discussed Warmly

One of the most interesting and long-drawn-out city council meetings in a long time was the regular meeting last night.

Probably the most important matter of business attended to was the application of A. B. Wood, G. B. Hengen, O. F. Paxton and F. L. Chambers for a franchise for an electric street railway in Eugene, as told about in another column of this paper.

WATER COMPANY LIABLE.

Another important matter was the reading of City Attorney L. E. Bean's opinion as to the city's and the water company's liability for damages on account of the bad water supply. The opinion as read is a voluminous document, the last paragraph of which is as follows:

"In conclusion I give it as my opinion, based on the foregoing authorities and other cases examined in the course of my research, first, that there is no liability against the city of Eugene on account of the impure supply furnished by the corporate company. Secondly, that the water company is liable to damages, if shown by competent proof that it has been negligent in furnishing the inhabitants of the city of Eugene with impure water by reason of which sickness and death from typhoid fever has been caused. Thirdly, after due and proper notice from the city to the water company and a reasonable time in which to remedy the existing evil, the said company continues to provide impure and unwholesome water to the city of Eugene and the residents thereof, the franchise and contract between the city and said company can be declared forfeited and annulled by proper suit brought therefor."

THE LIGHT QUESTION.

The arc light matter brought forth much discussion and considerable oratory. Some of the members were of the opinion that Fairmount was entitled to more than three lights, as apportioned by the committee, but the report of the committee was adopted, the mayor casting the deciding vote.

KELSEY'S BILL.

F. C. Kelsey's bill for furnishing plans for the municipal light and water plants came up for discussion again. After some discussion the bill was referred to the committee on finance.

Councilman Calkins introduced a resolution to the effect that the city hold another election on the question of voting \$100,000 bonds for the purpose of conducting a water plant, the election to be held on April 2. It failed to pass.

The council adjourned to meet in the city hall at 7:30 this evening.

CAUSE OF RECORD BREAKING WEATHER

Forecaster Beals states the minimum temperature of 22, which was reached at Portland Sunday, is the lowest for any March within ten years, and that it has been 30 years since such cold weather was reached this late in the month.
