The Selfish Motive

The Register states that it will answer the questions asked by the Guard and refuse the first one by saying it's none of the Guard's business. Wise answer.

It states that the timber cruising, in its estimation, was honestly done and will benefit the county, that the Guard's charge falls flat, etc., etc. A wise old "stand-pat" owl.

It angrily calls the Guard a sleepy sheet because this paper dares oppose the usurpation of the county road by a corporation. It is particularly gratified because Springfield business men have no objection to placing a barrier in the roadway between Eugene and Springfield. The Springfield citizens are good live business men and plainly see that no roadway at all from the south end of the county to Eugene would benefit the fast growing city of Springfield.

Eugene, however, is interested, as is the entire southern and eastern part of the county, and the efforts of the corporation sheet to aid in blocking one of the principal county roads leading to the county seat is in line with all its corporation tactics.

B. A. Washburne, of Springfield, states to the Guard that when he first saw the obstruction it looked serious to him, and thinks now the roadway should be at least 20 feet in the clear. The Guard is the only paper fearless enough to attack the method used in blocking the road, and through this course has secured electric lights at the crossing. In the placing of lights the county authorities and the railroad company admit the danger of the obstruction, as exclusively stated by the Guard.

Regarding the timber cruising graft the Guard will prove later on, beyond a reasonable doubt, that it was a graft, and further, the Guard will be the only paper in Lane county that will do so. An independent paper can do these things—no other will.

There are some breezes along the great Columbia river, especially that part of it a few hundred miles above the rift through the Cascade mountains, the latter a sort of funnel, as it were, to catch all the wind that blows from the ocean unobstructed along the river's wide lower channel. East of The Dalles the insistent wind of the present storm covered the railroad track in cuts three to nine feet deep with sand. FOUND UNCONSCIOUS AT HIS HOME

William Knispel, a German Farmer, Dies From Attack of Heart Trouble

William Knispel, a German, living alone on a farm about three miles northwest of Eugene, died last night about 10 o'clock from heart trouble. He was aged about 72 years and was a bachelor.

The old man had been slightly ill for several days. A son of John Kuest, who resides near his place, stopped at the old man's house yesterday afternoon and found him lying unconscious between the house and the woodshed. He was carrying in a basket of wood at the time the attack of his heart came on. He remained unconscious to the last. Dr. Johnson was called, but could do nothing for him.

The old man owned the little farm on which he lived and had been in this part of the country about three years. He had no near relatives, as far as could be ascertained.

The funeral was held this afternoon and the body interred in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

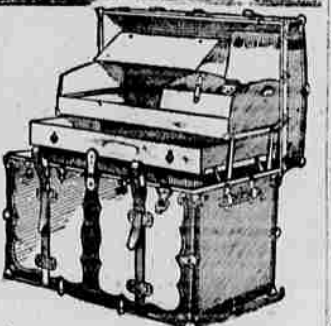
