SUES SOUTHERN PACIFIC CO. FOR \$6325 DAMAGES

Archibald Galbraith Alleges That His Stallion Was Injured on Company's Freight Train

Archibald R. Galbraith has begun suit in the circuit court for Lane county against the Southern Pacific Company for \$6325 damages, alleged to have been incurred by the injury to a stallion which was being shipped on the company's train.

The plaintiff alleges that on March 3, 1904, he delivered to the company at Portland a full-blooded English blue stallion named Danmore 2d, No. 558, weighing 1550 pounds and valued at \$3,000, to be carried to Albany and delivered to James H. Sheridan. It is alleged that while the freight train which was carrying the horse was at Salem the company's employees carelessly and negligently allowed another car to collide with the one which was carrying the stallion with such force as to knock the animal down, injuring him and making him sick and lame, rendering him unfit for use and of no greater value than the sum of \$10. GILBERT AND MCCRADY LATEST CANDIDATES

Nominated as Councilmen on Municipal Ownership Ticket--No One to Oppose Calkins

Who will oppose W. W. Calkins for councilman in the First ward at the city election on April 2? As yet no one seems willing to take up the fight against Mr. Calkins who is the nominee of the municipal ownership forces. The first ward is the strong hold of the municipal ownership and prohibition forces and it is almost useless to put up men against their candidate.

The latest candidates to file their nominating petitions are A. W. Gilbert and D. M. McCrady, from the Third and Fourth wards respectively. They are both ownership men. Gilbert, who will run against Frank Hampton, is ex chief of police and a well-known logging contractor. McCrady is a well-known painter. He will be J. M. Howe's opponent.

R. B. Henderson, the ownership candidate in the Second ward, will have an opponent Geo. T. Hall Sr., whose petition will be filed soon.

The last day on which nominating petitions can be filed is Friday, March 23.

FILTERS FOR THE CITY WATER PLANT

W. G. Gilstrap, manager of the Eugene Water Company, has received shipping receipts from the Roberts Filter Company which show that the filters for the Eugene water system were shipped on March 9th and 10th respectively. The filters were shipped on the Pennsylvania railroad cars numbers 14,189 and 282,448. Tracers follow these cars and reports will be made daily by telegraph as to the progress of the shipment.

The filters will probably arrive in Eugene about April 1st.

Note and Comment

The Guard is the only paper in Eugene, or Lane county for that matter, that has protested against the county court allowing the S. P. railroad to block the county road by driving piling obliquely across the driveway near Springfield. The county court observed the obstruction and ordered it removed, but later on, being promised a couple of lights so the beleated traveler could creep through the gap without injury, the railroad was allowed to hold the fort and blockade the main-traveled road of the county. Eugene has, however, a live organization, the Merchants' Protective Association, which, with the aid of the Guard, will see that the people's rights are protected. The Guard so far has made the fight alone, but with the Eugene merchants solidly protesting, the county court will reverse its decision; if not, upon proper presentation to the S. P. officials, who will, when they see the situation, make the necessary changes.
