MUCH BUILDING
FOR THIS YEAR

Present Activity Denotes Improve-
ments in 1906.

An unusual amount of building is
going on in Eugene west of Washing-
ton street. There are at present fifteen
buildings in the course of con-
struction or just completed, and the
next two weeks will see several more
houses started.

In the Campbell addition the Barger
residence will soon be completed and
will be followed shortly by a building
for Mr. Dunlap. Lombard is building
a couple of fine residences on Jeffer-
son street and two cottages are being
constructed in the Quimby addition,
while three new, modern cottages
have just been completed in the Had-
dleston addition. Grading work on
West Sixth and West Seventh streets
in the Campbell addition will com-
mence as soon as the ground dries suf-
ficiently and a contract for placing
about seven thousand feet of sidewalk
and about thirty street crossings will
be let at an early date.—Register,
March 15, 1906.

WOOLEN MILL
STARTS UP
MONDAY

Manufacture of Yarn Will Be
Commenced Next
Week

Entire Plant Will Be in Operation
Within a Short Time--New Picker
House Will Be Built of
Cement Blocks

Manager E. Koppe, of the Eugene
woolen mill, informs the Guard that
on Monday of next week the machin-
ery of the mill will be started up. At
first only yarn will be manufactured
and a small force of men employed,
but as fast as the other portions of
the machinery are got in order the
force will be increased and it will not
be long until the plant is operating to
its full capacity.

Some of the material is on the
ground for the new picker house
which will be located between the
main building of the woolen mill and
Midgley's saw and door factory. The
new building will be built of cement
blocks, the first structure of this ma-
terial to be erected in Eugene. It
will be 30x34 feet in dimensions and
one story in height. It is the aim of
the management to make the building
absolutely fire proof, and as little wood
as possible will be used in its con-
struction. W. O. Heckert has the con-
tract for the erection of the building.

While the new building is in course
of construction the old picker house,
which is inadequate to the needs of
the mill, will be used.
