What Is the Reason?

WANTED—To buy a lumber proposition on rail and water, mills and timber. Nothing wanted on Southern Pacific. Address "315," care the Timberman.

The above advertisement appeared in the March issue of the Timberman published at Portland. Much comment is indulged in upon the fact that the buyer would not purchase lands on the Southern Pacific system.

If the reason for this is caused by higher freight rates or shortage of cars, it should be remedied immediately. There must be some good reason for such an advertisement.

In 1905 lumber laden sail vessels to the number of 324, and 271 steam vessels sailed from Gray's Harbor, Washington, an average of eleven cargoes of lumber a week.

The Chicago letter in the Portland Timberman of March 3, tells how rough lumber that ten years ago was not very rapidly sold at \$8 to \$10 a thousand feet now brings \$18 to \$19, with good demand.

The Portland civil service commission has placed a limit on the age at which laborers on the city work may first be employed. Fifty years is the limit.

Corvallis has always been a town of sensations. The latest is a revival meeting at which the press correspondents say, "strong men weep like children." We venture the assertion that after the revival is over most if not all of these "strong" men will be as sin-hardened as ever.

Occasionally a crazy man imagines himself the possessor of boundless wealth. John B. Rockefeller's daughter, Mrs. Strong, heir to \$50,000,000, takes the other tack and has the delusion that she will die a pauper. She practices economy in her household, discharging several of her household help each day. Of course they don't quit, but the unbalanced mind takes no note of that, and the next day she repeats the supposed saving process.

District Attorney Jerome, of New York, holds the opinion that the giving political contributions from life insurance company funds does not constitute larceny, or any other crime. Of course the intent to commit a crime is wholly lacking in such a case. However, the exposure of the big contribution of the New York Life for political purposes will bear most excellent fruit in the passage of laws making it a crime for any officer of a company to thus wrongfully divert corporation funds.

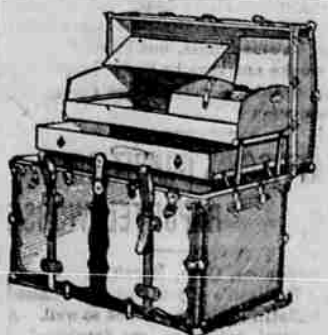
