Pacific Coast Lumber Resources

Lumber is beginning to dispute places with wheat on this North Pacific coast. With but one ship loading wheat at Portland there are thirteen loading lumber. Of course this is not the grain season, still the lumber season lasts all the year. Here is a list of the lumber carriers, with destination:

Steamer Northland, American, 2000 tons, San Francisco.

A hundred Chinese have been sent to the pine forests of Florida to take the place of striking men in turpentine works. They will receive 80 cents a day, where the strikers demanded \$1.50.

Tobacco, like bourbon, finds most congenial soil in Kentucky. In 1901 the bluegrass state raised 229,417,000 pounds, a little over a third of the entire amount, 690,490,000 pounds, grown in the country. North Carolina came next with 98,000,000 pounds in round numbers, Virginia third with 96,000,000 pounds, then it fell away off to 52,000,000 pounds in West Virginia.

Pennsylvania coal mine operators claim they have nine million tons of good merchantable coal stored within a radius of one hundred miles from New York, and should a strike occur will be able to supply all demands for months. Then there is a large supply held by dealers and the larger consumers in anticipation of trouble. But they may be claiming more than they have. A coal strike at this season of the year would be a serious affair, might possibly paralyze the business of the country as it did a few years ago when the miners were out three months.

Eighth Grade Examinations

DEATH OF MRS. EUPHAMA A. EDMUNSON

Early Oregon Pioneer Dies at Medford--Remains Will Arrive in Eugene Wednesday

Euphama A. Edmundson, an early Oregon pioneer, died at Medford, Oregon, March 26, 1906. She was born in Missouri March 3, 1820. In 1846 she came to Oregon by ox team across the plains, being at that time only 16 years of age. She was married at Salem in 1851. Eleven children were born to her, one of them dying in infancy. The others are: Rufus Edmundson, of Blaine, Arizona; Harry E. Edmundson, of Antone, Or.; Varian Farleigh, of Leland, Or.; Sarah Farleigh, of Beulah, Or.; John A. Edmundson, of Modesto, Cal.; Francis Woodward, of Beulah, Or.; Frank T. Edmundson, of Westfall, Or.; Mary Kietin, deceased; Deliah J. Lyons, deceased; Virginia A. Copeland, deceased.

Mrs. Edmundson was a member of the Baptist church and had lived a Christian since she was 14 years of age.

The remains will arrive in Eugene Wednesday and the funeral will be held Thursday at 2 p. m., with interment in the Mulkey cemetery.

MISS DE WOLF DIES AT PORTLAND

Miss Florence Lella DeWolf, a well-known student of the University of Oregon, died in Portland last night of typhoid fever and spinal meningitis. She was taken to Portland from Eugene about two weeks ago. It is understood that the body will be taken to Canada for burial.

Miss DeWolf was born at St. Andrews, New Brunswick, Canada, October 1, 1887. She was in her freshman year at the university, being registered from Portland. Her many friends are grieved to hear of her death.
