The Coming Election

Eugene will have a city election next Monday that will probably be the bitterest strife in the history of this city.

It is the duty of every citizen to vote at that election according to the dictates of his conscience, regardless of all consequences.

The issue is square and clean-cut. The municipal ownership ticket, as we understand the matter, is for the municipal ownership of light and water systems in this city and at the same time in favor of making Eugene a "dry" town. The ticket opposed to this is composed of good business men who are in favor of allowing the water and light systems to remain under the control of the present owners, with a strict supervision to be held by the city authorities. This ticket is also in favor of continuing Eugene as a "wet" town.

Some deny that the temperance question cuts any figure in the matter, but from the personnel of both tickets and from the past positions taken by both sides we believe that there is no doubt that the temperance and municipal ownership people have linked their fortunes, while the "wets" and anti-municipal ownership people are fighting together.

This election is important to every citizen of Eugene, and the vote should be the largest in the history of the city.

The cabal about the president that would get rid of Taft as a presidential possibility by an appointment to the supreme court bench is thus sarcastically dealt with in a Washington dispatch:

One of the most beautiful, unselfish and yet pathetic scenes was that one at the White House when men prominent enough to be urged as presidential possibilities, like Mr. Fairbanks, Secretary Shaw and Secretary Root, urged Mr. Taft to accept the offer of a place on the supreme court. In these days of greed and inordinate ambition it is reassuring to see public men looking out for the welfare of their contemporaries.

A prominent New York Journal is authority for the statement that over five million women are engaged in this country in gainful occupations, and their number is increasing faster than that of men. Out of 303 scheduled occupations women were employed in all but eight—the army and navy, fire departments and helpers to roofers, slaters, steam boiler makers and brass workers. Chronically enough the making of women's wear is the only employment in which women show decreasing proportionate numbers. Between 1890 and 1900 men dressmakers increased 150 per cent, and women dressmakers 18 per cent; men milliners increased 340 per cent, and women milliners 40 per cent.

Eighth Grade Examinations

The final eighth grade examination for the public schools will be held on May 17 and 18, June 14 and 15, 1906.

Teachers who have pupils ready for the examination should notify the chairman of the school board, whose duty it is to conduct the examinations in person or appoint some one other than the teacher, and notify me of the number of questions and who is to conduct the said examination so the examiner may receive the questions in time.
