Pacific University, Forest Grove, has discarded the provision in its charter requiring that a majority of the eighteen trustees should be members of the Congregational church. This action was taken in order that they might receive a share of the income from the fifteen million dollars set apart by Andrew Carnegie for the support of aged professors of non-denominational schools.

Judge Arthur Frazer of the Portland circuit court says that a vast majority of the seven hundred cases of juvenile delinquents he has handled went wrong because of lack of proper home care and surroundings. Then, he says, parents permit young boys and girls to go alone to theatres and other places of amusement, then wonder why they go bad. The judge seems to think it better parents that are wanted.

Though every important city of the United States, except New York, showed clearing house increases last week, nearly all the gains being substantial percentages, the falling off of New York in the seemingly small percentage of 2.2 was nearly entirely responsible for a net decrease of two per cent. This will be appreciated through the statement that bank clearings of New York last week were \$1,758,450,000 out of a total of \$2,793,350,000 of the ninety-one clearing house cities—nearly two-thirds of the bank settlements of the country passing through its clearing house.
