The revelation came as a shock to the social circle in which Mrs. Knecht moved. For years she had been known as a model wife and devout churchgoer, the owner of a pew in one of the fashionable churches, and has been prominent in all social affairs of the church. Her daughter is now being educated in a convent, and so perfectly did the woman maintain the dual role that none of her friends suspected that she was anything but what she pretended to be.

Even after Mrs. Knecht admitted that she was Florence Osborne, the owner of a disreputable house and had been arrested several times friends found it hard to believe the story. Mrs. Knecht was compelled to admit her dual life on the witness stand in a suit for divorce she brought on the grounds of cruelty. After the revelation the suit was dismissed.
