TRIUMPHANT RETURN OF RED WING TEAM

Basketball Players Given a Rousing Ovation Upon Their Arrival Home

The following account of the return to Red Wing, Minn., of the Red Men's basketball team which played against the U. O. team in Eugene several weeks ago, will be read with interest by the many friends that the Minnesota boys won while here, the account being clipped from the Red Wing Daily Republican of March 13:

"Red Wing has not witnessed for some time any such spontaneous and heartfelt ovation as was extended last evening to the victorious Red Men, who returned on the 8:30 train from the west, after a six weeks' trip in the West as the champions who defeated overwhelmingly the largest number of skilled basketball teams they encountered.

The shouts of two thousand exultant throats, the firing of guns, the military band, playing its most popular airs, told of the joy of their home coming; and such a scene. The red of the Indian's regalia, the blazing torches and colored lights, mingled with the purple and black of dress made a scene indescribably brilliant; bits of snow, vagrant flakes swirled in the air to give the picture its wintry setting.

The basketball boys were placed in open backs, driven by prancing horses, and five hundred men and boys headed by the Red Wing Military band followed in line for the triumphant march through the business district. Hundreds thronged both sides of the line of march eager for a glimpse of the returning athletes.

Thunders of applause resounded on every side. The demonstration ended at the opera house, but not until the Red Men were placed on the stage and introduced as the Red Wing Red Men, champions of the West. E. P. Neill and A. J. Schunk responded in behalf of the team, both thanking the Red Men and the citizens for the loyal welcome the 'big five' had received."

MAY GET SAMPLE ROAD THIS YEAR

Senator Fulton Can Secure Road Builders For Eugene if Material, Etc., Are Provided

Paul Shoup, assistant general freight agent of the Southern Pacific Company, writes Agent Adair, of the local depot, as follows:

"Senator C. W. Fulton, in response to an inquiry from us, informs us that if he can have assurance from the county officials that they will provide the material, labor, etc., which the government requires they shall in such venture, he will take up with the government the subject of constructing a sample half mile or mile of road adjacent to your town. The government furnishes the machinery and directs the operation, and we will furnish free transportation."

Mr. Shoup also says that Salem is arranging for a sample mile of road to be built there this summer.

The Good Roads Association should at once take up this matter and secure the government machinery immediately after or before it is used at Salem, thereby saving time in transportation.

It will be remembered that two years ago an effort was made to secure this machinery and the government road builders for a sample road here, but for some reason the matter was abandoned. It is hoped that those interested may meet with better success this time.

Son of Mayor Wilkins is Private Secretary to Mayor Moore of Seattle.

The Seattle Times of April 3 prints a picture of Frank Wilkins, son of Mayor and Mrs. F. M. Wilkins, of Eugene, and says:

"Frank L. Wilkins, a well-known business man of this city and who has lived in Oregon and Washington all his life, has been appointed private secretary to the mayor by Judge William Hickman Moore. Mr. Wilkins assumed his new duties this morning. The announcement of his appointment was made by Mayor Moore last night.

"The new secretary was for four years identified with the Dexter Horton bank, but is now in the real estate business. He lives in the fourth precinct of the Seventh ward and has known Mayor Moore for the past eight years, or for the entire time he has resided in Seattle. It is understood that the mayor has considered appointing Mr. Wilkins ever since his election as the city's chief executive.

"Mr. Wilkins is a native son of the Northwest. He was born in Oregon, where his father was born in 1847, when Washington was a part of Oregon, and both were practically unknown to the country at large."
