PETITION FOR INCORPORATION.
To the Honorable County Court of
Lane County, Oregon:

Your petitioners, the undersigned,
legal voters and residents of the vil-
lage of Coburg, in Lane county, Ore-
gon, do most respectfully represent
and show to your honorable court that
we are legal voters of said village, and
residents within the boundaries there-
of as hereinafter described; that we
desire to become incorporated under
the provisions of the act of 1893, en-
titled, "An act for a general law for
the incorporation of cities and towns
in the State of Oregon."

That the boundaries of the town of
Coburg be as follows: Commencing
at the southeast corner of Casandra
E. G. Delany's land in section 33,
township 16, s r 3 w., run thence
north to the section line between sec-
tions 33 and 28, thence west to the
county road, thence south along the
centre of said county road to the cen-
tre of the large Mill Slough, thence
along the centre of said Mill Slough
to a point due west from the point of
commencement, and thence east to
the place of beginning.

That within the boundaries as above
described there are now residing
about seven hundred people, residents
and inhabitants of said bounded dis-
trict.

Wherefore your petitioners pray
that said town of Coburg, Lane coun-
ty, Oregon, be incorporated under the
provisions of the said acts above re-
ferred to.
