SOME INTERESTING

SUGGESTIONS

Editor Guard:—Now that the smoke of battle has cleared and the people have declared themselves for the third time for municipal ownership within the last 12 months, we ought now to get down to business. Being a municipal ownership elector, I have been asked to express my thoughts on what ought to be the next move.

The following line of procedure suggests itself to me as being equitable and just. I think there ought to be a commission of representative citizens of our city appointed for the purpose of putting into effect the expressed wish of the people at our last city election. Said commission should invite the water company to meet with them for the purpose of arranging for the purchase of the present water system. We can and should be fair with the water company, and at the same time just to the people of Eugene. As our interests are identical, regardless of how we voted, we should have no enemies to punish or friends to favor. The sole object of all should be the building up of Eugene. I believe if the present water company is inclined to be fair, that the people of Eugene will be willing to meet them more than half way. I do not know what the present plan is worth, and would not pretend to say, but that fact can be ascertained by competent authority, which ought to be to the satisfaction of the company and our people. We know it is not worth as much as a new one, but the fact of it being in and ready for use should be considered by the purchaser. If a purchase cannot be effected which is fair and equitable then and in that case we should proceed to install a plant owned and controlled by the city, and without unnecessary delay. As to a gravity system, I would prefer it to a pumping system, even at a cost of more than double that of a pumping system.

Believing in the stability and good judgment of the people of Eugene, I have no doubt but what the best thing will be done, and in the best way to do it.

That is one reason why my vote is going for Sheriff Tom Word, of Portland, for his renomination, and for Sheriff Harvey K. Brown, of Baker City, for governor on the R. publican ticket. It is not a fact generally known, but a fact, nevertheless, that Word, when he opened up on the Portland gamblers and began to enforce the laws in that city, was waited on by an emissary of the gamblers and offered ten thousand dollars to quit. The sheriff laughed in the face of the would-be briber, and would have kicked him out of the office, only he knew that the fellow was merely a lawyer employed for that purpose and not personally to blame. I don't know how much Harvey Brown, the Republican reform sheriff of Baker City, now seeking the nomination for governor on the Republican ticket, was offered by the saloon men and gamblers of that town to abandon his crusade in Baker county, but this I do know, if it had been \$25,000 Brown would have told the man who offered it that he was not for sale."

WILL DISCUSS PLAYING OF RUGBY FOOTBALL

O., is arranging for a meeting of college representatives of the Northwest in April to discuss the adoption of Rugby football in the larger institutions of Oregon, Washington and Idaho and at any rate to revise the present intercollegiate rules. Chandler and Captain Latourrette of next year's Oregon eleven both think that Rugby would find but little favor in the valley.

ALLEGED MURDERER CAUGHT

Jack Mitchell, Wanted in Idaho, Arrested by Eugene Officers

Captured on This Afternoon's Train Upon Advices From Portland Officers--Will Be Taken Back

Sheriff Fisk and Chief of Police Farrington boarded the southbound train as it stopped in Eugene at 3 o'clock this afternoon and arrested a man by the name of Jack Mitchell, wanted in Idaho on the charge of murder.

Chief Farrington this forenoon received a telephone message from the officers at Portland informing him that Mitchell was on this train and instructing him to detain the man and place him under arrest. He was found by the chief and the sheriff in the smoking car and submitted to arrest without any resistance or comment.

A Portland officer will arrive here on tonight's train and take the prisoner back with him.

The local officers know nothing of the crime of which Mitchell is accused, nor do they know at what point in Idaho the crime is alleged to have been committed. All they know is that the man under arrest is the one described by the Portland officers. He is 30 years old and weighs about 200 pounds.
