PROTEST AGAINST THE FRANCHISE

East Eugene Improvement Club Doesn't Like New Street Railway Proposition

Wants Provision That City May Purchase System After Ten Years and Wants Line to Springfield Through Fairmount

At a recent meeting of the East Eugene (Fairmount) Improvement Club resolutions of protest against the city council granting a franchise to the B. Hengen, A. B. Wood, O. F. Paxton and F. L. Chambers for a street railway system under the conditions and provisions as recently asked for were adopted and it was ordered that the protest be presented to the council at its next meeting.

The protest as formulated by the committee is as follows:

"The members of the East Eugene Improvement Club sincerely believe that there should be no franchise of public utility granted to any individual, company or corporation unless such franchise provides: First, that after a period of ten years the street railway system within the city limits, or the industry of any character named, may be taken over by the city if it so desires. Second, that such franchise shall provide for paying to the city a reasonable share of the profits derived from the use of the streets and alleys so granted, after a period of ten years. Third, that the city of Eugene shall retain the right to allow any other individual, company or corporation that may desire to enter the city of Eugene on the same streets and over the same tracks with cars or trains of cars by paying a reasonable charge therefor, which shall be mutually agreed upon by the said companies, and if such agreement cannot be reached by the said rival companies, then in such event the

common council of the city of Eugene shall have full power and authority to arbitrate in such business agreement. Fourth, that the life of the franchise shall not exceed a period of twenty-five years. Fifth, that such franchise shall provide for annual reports to be rendered to the common council of the city of Eugene of all business transacted by them, and if at any time it be so desired the common council may make a full investigation of all the books and papers kept for the purpose of record of all business transacted by the said franchise holders.

DIFFERENT ROUTE TO SPRINGFIELD.

"Further, the members of this club do most vigorously protest against the granting of any street railway franchise in the city of Eugene unless the applicants will build a line connecting Eugene and Springfield, passing the State University, through Fairmount and on through to Springfield and to the east end of that city, this being in our opinion the only feasible route that will be beneficial to both cities; and especially is this necessary for the benefit of the State University. Under these conditions students living at the east end of Springfield could attend the university with as much ease as though they lived but a few blocks away.

BASIS FOR PROTEST.

"Our protest is based upon the sound civic principles: First, that a public utility franchise is property and in a growing city increases very rapidly in value. Second, no city should be alienated for a long period from control of its rights and property. Third, that a public utility franchise is a special privilege, and when exclusive or irrevocable creates a privileged class with perpetual right to prey upon the earnings of the common people. Fourth, that franchises when granted under the most favorable conditions tend to become monopolies, work injustice and favor petty tyranny. They are the principal sources of graft and corruption in city government."
