The Terror of Vesuvius

When one hundred and fifty thousand people leave their homes about the slopes of Vesuvius and take refuge in Naples, some ten miles away, the popular dread and apprehension as to the terrible mountain may be imagined.

Vesuvius, the most celebrated volcano in the world, rising about 4000 feet from the eastern margin of the Bay of Naples, in Italy, in the midst of a region which has been densely populated for more than twenty centuries, has served as a type for the general popular conception of a volcano, while its history has supplied a large part of the information on which geological theories of volcanic action are based.

The height of the mountain varies from time to time by several hundred feet, according to the effects of successive eruptions, but averages 4000 feet in height. At the time of its greatest dimensions the volcano was perhaps twice as high as it is now. By a colossal eruption of which no historical record remains, the upper half of the mountain was undoubtedly blown away. It was around this truncated cone that the early Greek settlers founded their little colonies, little imagining the terrible nature of the mountain. At the beginning of the Christian era and for many previous centuries no eruption had taken place, and the volcanic nature of the locality was perhaps not even suspected by the inhabitants, who planted their vineyards along its fertile slopes and built numerous towns and villages about its base.

After the centuries of quiescence the volcanic energy began again to manifest itself about the year 63, and for sixteen years its convulsions continued at different times doing much damage to surrounding towns, culminating in 79 in a catastrophe that after all these centuries stands out as one of the greatest of human history. Then Herculaneum, at the western base, Pompeii, on the southeast side, and Stabia, still farther north, were covered so deep by the ashes and volcanic mud that for centuries their locations were but a matter of conjecture.

For nearly fifteen hundred years Vesuvius kept quiet but for occasional growlings, and its crater walls some five miles in circumference were hung with trees and brushwood, while the slopes below were covered with vegetation. Then came a series of earthquakes lasting about six months, only to culminate December 16, 1631, in a grand paroxysmal effort, when streams of lava reached the sea at thirteen different points. So swiftly did destruction come that 18,000 lives were lost.

Since this great convulsion, which emptied the crater, Vesuvius has never relapsed into a condition of total quiescence. At intervals varying from a few months to a few years it has broken into eruption, sometimes emitting only steam, dust and scoria, but frequently also streams of lava.

Knowing its terrible history what must be the dread of the people who live about it upon any recurrence of more than usual activity!

Another old story: In a launch on the Mississippi at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Saturday, a woman rocked the boat in sport. Three were killed by its overturning. This rocking boat for fun comes next to the gun that was thought unloading for foolish needless fatalities.

Looking For a Librarian

At a meeting of the library board, held April 7th, it was resolved that applications for the position of librarian be received until May 1st, 1906; and that it will be expected of the librarian when selected to work with the organizer during the time she is employed, without compensation; and thereafter shall receive a salary of \$30 per month for the first six months, with a probable increase, if services are satisfactory, of \$5 per month of such succeeding six months until the sum of \$50 per month salary is reached; and that the librarian will be expected to give at least eight hours per day services.

It is expected to employ a trained organizer for about three months, commencing about June 1st next.
