OREGON COAST AND EASTERN INCORPORATED

Construction Work to Commence Within Next Four Months

J. G. WOOLLEY ADDRESSES THE PUBLIC

Famous Prohibition Worker Spoke at the Courthouse Today

Rights of Way for Wilsey Railroad Secured for Almost Entire Distance From Portland to Humboldt Bay

Has Just Returned From New Zealand Where He Has Been Conducting a Local Option Campaign

The Oregon Coast & Eastern Railway Company, after preliminary work covering a period of two years, filed articles of incorporation today for the building of approximately 1200 miles of main line in the state of Oregon, says yesterday's Portland Journal. The syndicate has for months had about 40 men at work on the rights of way, and now has four-fifths of it secured for the coast line from Portland to Humboldt Bay, California. Construction work will be fully under way within the next four months.

The syndicate includes St. Louis, New York and Oregon men, and work is being pushed under the direction of William J. Wilsey, of Portland, a timber man, who was the original promoter of the road. The men named in the incorporation papers are: W. J. Wilsey, John M. Eddy and William M. Gregory. The officers and directors of the company will be as follows: President, John H. Crabtree, St. Louis; vice president and general manager, W. J. Wilsey, Portland; directors, Messrs. Crabtree and Wilsey, John L. Stockwell, capitalist, St. Louis; Joseph S. McIntire, capitalist, St. Louis; Floyd Stock, capitalist, St. Louis; William Gregory, Portland; W. J. Patterson, Baker City; John M. Eddy, Eugene; J. L. Simpson, lumberman, North Bend. Mr. Gregory, a Portland attorney, will be general counsel.

CORNELL CHIEF ENGINEER.

George B. Cornell, a well-known New York civil engineer, will be chief engineer and will be on the ground within a few days. He has gained some distinction in the railroad world by having been the chief engineer of the Metropolitan Elevated Railway, in New York City.

The capital stock of the company is \$10,000,000, and this amount has already been subscribed by the New York and St. Louis capitalists interested. A party of these men will visit Portland within a short time and make a trip over the entire line, accompanied by a New York consulting engineer, for the purpose of deciding final locations. The coast line will be 400 miles long and the line through central Oregon from Coos Bay to the Snake river will be 800 miles, forming a junction with the line and probably connecting with the Moffatt road and the Chicago & Northwest-ern.

It is said to be the plan of the company to await local developments relating to railroads now projected before coming into Portland with territorial or right of way propositions.

"When we reach that point in our arrangements we will come before the people of Portland with a direct, liberal proposition," said Mr. Wilsey, "and we will expect to be received in the same spirit."

The company's charter provides that it may operate steamboats on the waters of the north Pacific ocean and may extend its lines into Washington, California, Idaho and Utah.

INVESTIGATIONS BY FORESTRY SERVICE

Examinations Made in McKenzie River and Bohemia Mining District

Cottage Grove, Or., April 10.—G. M. Homans, special agent of the forest service, has returned from a five days' trip to the forest reserve along Frank Brice creek. He is investigating conditions in the reserve relative to the sale of the mature timber. He thinks he has arrived at a value of the timber that will be satisfactory to the department. Several bids have been made on the reserve timber in quantities of 100,000, 200,000 to 300,000,000 feet.

G. M. Ingram, also of the forestry service, who has been in the reserve in the vicinity of the Bohemia mines estimating timber and mapping, came out Saturday and goes from here to the McKenzie river. Mr. Ingram says he has never seen any land along the McKenzie which would be more valuable for agriculture than for its timber.
