Statement Was True.

Just previous to the recent city election the Guard had an editorial which gave its views of the situation. The article was neither in favor of nor against either side, but was just a fair and impartial view. The statement was made that the municipal ticket was linked with the "prohibition" while the "wets" were with the opposite side. The municipal ownership advocates declared the statement was false, that such an idea or combination had not been formed, and the Guard gave the denial publicity, as asked for by the municipal ownership leaders. At the same time we contended that our statement was correct and asked the candidates to give us their views. A. W. Gilbert was the only one who did so. He said he had nothing whatever against the saloons, and to show his attitude proved it by actual demonstration.

The council meeting last night proved that the Guard's assertion in its pre-election editorial was correct. Three measures antagonistic to the saloon interests were introduced by Councilmen Calkins and Garrett, who were supported in each instance by Councilmen Henderson, McCrady and Gilbert. Two of the measures introduced were meritorious, but the third showed beyond a doubt that Eugene's saloon men must toe the mark if they are permitted to run at all under the present city council, and were it not for the mayor's veto power we believe Eugene's saloons would be forced to close immediately. In the coming primary election there is a clean-cut issue outside of politics. Certain candidates will be supported by municipal ownership advocates, while those favoring saloons will vote for others. The fight will not end until the June election. There will probably be a hard fight on local option, not only in Eugene, but throughout the county. The temperance men will expect the vote of the municipal ownership adherents, and if they receive them the election will not only be close, in Eugene but in all probability Lane county will vote for a trial of the local option law.
