For a Progressive City.

The business interests and progressive element of Eugene want an electric street car system in this city and connection with Springfield.

Last year A. R. Black and associates asked for a franchise for such a system as Eugene needs and desires, but as the council ignored his proposition, Mr. Black after weeks of waiting withdrew his application. The Guard at the time urged the council to accept Mr. Black's proposition, as we fully realize what the inclination of the council in this matter means to Eugene.

The Willamette Valley Company is now asking for a franchise similar to the one proposed by Mr. Black, excepting the system will be much greater in extent. In addition to the Eugene system, with the Springfield connection, there will be lines extending from Eugene up the McKenzie, Willamette and Mohawk valleys, besides prospective lines south, west and to Portland on the north. A system of this kind is of great importance to Eugene and Lane county, and personal differences and prejudices, if any exist, should be thrown to the winds. The council should not allow another opportunity to go by as the Black proposition was.

We want a street car system, but at the same time the city's interests must be properly protected. There is no doubt but that the company would accept a franchise that would be fair to all concerned.

A majority of the members of the council have stated that they favor a progressive city and an electric car system, and the Guard believes that every member will do his utmost to obtain it.

If the council has any doubts as to how the people of Eugene stand on this subject, let them interview the business interests. If this is not satisfactory submit the proposition to a vote of the people.

The perennial resolution calling for inquiry as to political contributions has blossomed a gain. This time Senator Tillman wants to find out how much the national banks contributed towards the last presidential election.
