

ENCOURAGE MANUFACTURING INDUSTRIES
Merchants' Association Will Give a Banquet in Near Future
To Which All Manufacturers in Eugene Will Be Invited--Committee Will Visit Coal Mines South-west of the City

The Eugene Merchants' Protective Association was organized not only for the mutual protection of the members, but also for the purpose of fostering and encouraging the manufacturing enterprises already here and inducing new ones to locate here. At last night's meeting of the association a committee was appointed to arrange for a banquet and a social good time to be given in the near future, and representatives from every manufacturing enterprise in the city will be invited to attend. This is done with the idea of promoting a more friendly spirit between the merchants and manufacturers, and to assure the latter that the association is willing to work with them and to increase the number of such enterprises in the city. The committee appointed to arrange for the banquet consists of the following: M. S. Harter, W. S. Moon, W. M. Green, G. D. Linn and J. W. Kays. The date and place for holding the banquet will be decided upon later.

It is the intention of the association within a few days to appoint a committee of 15 or 20 to visit the open coal mine of the Spencer Butte Coal and Petroleum Company, ten miles southwest of the city, to show the promoters that the merchants heartily approve of the project and to lend their moral support and encouragement.

BARBERS FIX NEW HOURS AND PRICES
Meeting of Association Held Last Night--Black List of Dead Beats Established

The Barbers' Association of Eugene held a meeting at Geo. Sovern's shop on West Eighth street last night, at which time prices and hours were agreed upon. Beginning May 1 the hours and prices will be as follows:
Hours--Open shops, 7:30 a. m., close shops at 8 p. m., except Saturdays at 10 p. m. Close shops at noon on the following holidays: New Years, Fourth of July, Thanksgiving and Christmas; on Decoration Day closing hours between 10 a. m. and 3 p. m.

Prices--At 15-cent shops: Shave, 15 cents; hair cut, 25 cents; single, 25 cents; shampoo, plain, 25 cents; shampoo, extra, 35 cents; perfume, 25 cents; beard trimming, 25 cents; face massage, 35 cents; head massage, 35 cents; razor honing, 30 cents; tonics, 10 cents; neck shaving, 5 cents; monstache, 5 cents; one or both of the latter two may be given free when the bill reaches 25 cents or over; shaving on holidays, 10 cents extra; shaving outside of shop, 50 cents. The prices for the 10-cent shops are the same as the others, except for shaves, which will be ten cents.

In addition to the hours and prices it was agreed to establish a black list, and hereafter no dead beats can get credit at any of the shops.

All the barbers in the city have signed the schedule of hours and prices. They are: Fifteen-cent shops--Rathmell & Branstetter, Geo. Sovern, Schewering & Lindley, Dea & Barnard, J. R. Caldwell, C. Marx and D. S. Gore; 10-cent shops, R. P. Chambers and F. M. Steffer.

ADMINISTRATOR APPOINTED
Probate Judge Chrisman today appointed Paul B. Berlin administrator of the estate of his wife, Caddie D. Berlin, who died at Woonsocket, S. D., March 16, 1906. The value of the property of the estate is \$5200, of which \$5000 is cash in the First National Bank of Eugene and \$200 personal property. Berlin was also appointed guardian of his two minor children, Frances and Owen, who are the beneficiaries of a life insurance policy of \$1000 held by their father.

CLOGGED SEWER CAUSES TROUBLE
Street Commissioner Turner and Assistant Baker are having a great deal of trouble with the main sewer in the alley extending north and south between Willamette and Oak streets. There has been an obstruction in the sewer between East Ninth street for a week or more and it cannot be dislodged. The commissioners have 120 feet of iron pipe and a line of hose that length in the sewer, with a big stream of water playing on the obstruction, but seemingly without effect.

WEEKLY BULLETIN ON OREGON WEATHER
The Past Week Was Sunshiny and Warmer Than Usual--Some Showers

The weather bureau at Portland has resumed its weekly weather and crop bulletins. Following are portions of the bulletin for the week ending today, April 17:

GENERAL SUMMARY.
The past week was sunshiny, dry, and warmer than usual. No rain fell in the southeastern part of the state and but few showers occurred elsewhere. Light frosts were reported generally on Tuesday and Thursday mornings and in a few places on Wednesday morning. The afternoons of the 13th and 14th were unusually warm, but on the 15th it turned cooler and nearly normal temperatures prevailed thereafter. The winds, as a rule, were light and mostly from the west, except where they were diverted from their normal track by topographical conditions.

WILLAMETTE VALLEY.
Portland, Multnomah county.--The weather was generally clear until Sunday, when clouds gathered, and by Monday morning the weather had become showery. Light frost occurred in exposed places on Tuesday morning and Thursday morning. Thursday afternoon the weather was warm, and Friday afternoon was unusually warm. On the remaining days of the week the temperatures were nearly normal. The winds, as a rule, were light and from the northwest.

Aurora, Marion county.--Weather very pleasant.
Forest Grove, Washington county.--Weather fine during the week.
Corvallis, Benton county.--Pleasant weather prevailed during the entire week; no damaging frosts.

McKenzie Bridge, Lane county.--Weather warm and pleasant during the day; nights cool and frosty.
