What will the council do with the street railway franchise?

Eugene cannot afford to let a golden opportunity to secure a first-class system of street railways go by.

The council is discussing better fire fighting apparatus. For years the need of such action has been apparent to everybody.

Eugene has reached a point where she must have a street railway system to help her expand. Some kind of a franchise which insures the construction of a line at once should be granted without delay.

Silverton, Colorado, is in touch with the world again, and the world is in touch with Silverton, at least to the extent of ten barrels of whiskey. March 13th an immense avalanche covered three hundred feet of the railroad fifty feet deep, and the obstruction has just been tunneled through. Fifty-seven cars of freight were the first to pass through. Sixty barrels and the ten barrels of whiskey were the first articles unloaded.

It appears doubtful that the combination chemical engine and hose wagon will be purchased by the city. While there has been no vote upon the matter it seems that a majority of the councilmen favor the purchase or the hiring of a team to be ready at all times to haul the apparatus to fires and retaining the old chemical engine. All favor an increase in the number of hydrants and the purchase of more hose.

The Portland automobile ordinance allows a speed of eight miles an hour. Policemen got their stop watches out the other day and timed some of their brethren with the result of nineteen complaints. The slowest speed was sixteen miles an hour, double the speed limit, and the highest thirty miles. About speed, the driving does not easily make eight miles an hour on a good road is hardly worth having.

Portland was on the point of losing Jim Hill's north bank railroad because of the dilatory tactics of the Port of Portland commission in granting a franchise for the bridge across the Willamette. The newspapers and the people of that city in general made a big "holler" and just as Hill was about to withdraw from the field the commission granted a favorable franchise. Eugene might lose the valley electric railroad by tactics similar to the Portland commission's.
