The dreadful destruction of San Francisco and other towns in that vicinity is the worst calamity known in the history of the western hemisphere. The Galveston tidal wave, Johnstown flood, Chicago and Boston fires are small and insignificant when compared with our sister state's awful, nearly incomprehensible catastrophe.

The Bay City and surrounding country has our sympathy. We of the coast are bound together by ties of relationship, friendship and business. Our interests are identical and we extend our sympathy, but our aid is what is needed now.

Thousands of poor persons are suffering for want of provisions, and the railroads and express companies will transport free of charge all offerings of provisions or money.

Eugene should act immediately. We should not wait until we get a carload, but send donations as they are received daily. This is the true sympathy which we should give to our afflicted brothers and sisters in the Golden State—the sympathy which shows our heads, hearts and hands are with them.

The telegraph says the Chicago police had hard work Monday saving John Curiale, a Greek, from being killed by an infuriated mob of men and women for attempting to assault a nine-year-old girl. They should have kept hands off.

The reader would probably pass the announcement of the death of William Thomas, a laborer on the Corvallis water reservoir, by a cable Monday, but for the statement at the end that he left a widow and six small children in destitute circumstances. There is pathos in that.

The trial of George Blodgett at Portland for the murder of the dance hall woman who got his money then deserted him, brings out a letter from her to him acknowledging the receipt of money sent her and stating that she had made 55 cents percentage for selling drinks in Fritz's dance hall (should have been written "hell") the night before. With such manifest returns in a place where there are so many possibilities it is any wonder that the women employed generally go wrong, that is if not wrong before.
