REPORTS GOOD PROGRESS

Washington, April 21.—General Funston wires this morning: "Fire is making no progress through the west from Van Ness avenue. A west wind of considerable force is beginning. Indications are that the part of the city south of Van Ness avenue and west of the bay will be destroyed. Apprehension is felt for Fort Larson, but we expect to save it.

The weather is fine and warm and there is practically no suffering from cold. It is impossible to establish proper sanitary conditions. I expect much sickness will result. If the city to the west now standing intact remains a number of buildings will be

used as hospitals. The water supply is encouraging and we expect to get 12,000,000 gallons daily."

Earlier dispatches, received at 2:23 this morning, say:

"Fighting hard, probably a successful fight, and hope to save the west portion of the city. Supplies arriving. Admiral Goodrich landed all available men and placed them under my orders."

Rumor That Oakland Was Burning This Morning Proves False

CLOSE CONTEST FOR STATE NOMINEES

Jonathan Bourne and H. M. Cake Run a Tie Race

Hawley Probably Nominee for Congress, While Withycombe and Geer Have a Nip and Tuck Fight

Portland, April 21.—Partial returns from Multnomah county show T. T. Geer in the lead for Republican nomination for Governor, with Withycombe second. Johns is clearly out of the running, taking third place. In the senatorial contest Cake has a decisive lead over Bourne for the nomination, with Lowell third. Bourne is making a better showing outside. Benson and Gatch are running a neck and neck race for secretary of state, and the voting in outside counties will probably decide the result. Hoyt has displaced all competitors for the Republican nomination for state treasurer in this county, but reports from Southern Oregon show that in that part of the state he is far behind. Hoyt's plurality in this county promises, however, to be large enough to overcome Carter's vote in the remainder of the state. Steel is in the fight for Multnomah is favored. Willis Dunnaway has overwhelming plurality for state printer and is clearly the party nominee. To Wood won a signal victory over Kelley in the contest for the Democratic nomination for Sheriff. His majority is at least 3 to 1. In one side precinct Word received 40 out of 41 votes cast. The struggle for the Republican nomination for sheriff has developed some surprises. Stevens has shown some unexpected strength in many of the east side precincts he leads Stevens by decisive pluralities. Stevens is stronger on the west side. County Judge Webster has been re-nominated by a large plurality. The congressional contest furnished
