A map just published at San Francisco shows 453 city blocks burned. Number buildings estimated at 60,000.

Jonathan Bourne carried the Republican primary. But he is still a long way off from the United States senate.

The extent of the relief extended San Francisco is shown by the statement that five hundred teams are employed hauling supplies to the 60-odd relief stations.

The women of San Francisco are getting some of the health if not pleasure that comes from camping out. They are cooking out of doors not only in camps but in the portion of the city not destroyed, pending rebuilding of fires.

Murdock McDonald, Scotch if there is anything in a name, has a ewe in his band at Arlington, Oregon, that gave birth to five lambs the other day. Not only much of a family sheep, but a profitable one. The ewe mother of twins seldom fails to repeat on subsequent occasions.

A St. Louis man has killed his brother. He says he did it on a command given by their father thirty years ago, and to preserve future generations. It is not surprising to learn that he was just out of a sanitarium. He should be kept there when put back.

Some public men have a very bad habit. For instance a dispatch from Paris yesterday gave the information that Ambassador McCormick made a "long address" at the unveiling of a statue of Ben Franklin. He is old enough to know better.

It is against orders to build fires or use lights in remaining San Francisco buildings, a precaution against fire till flames and chimneys are rebuilt or pronounced safe and the water supply rehabilitated. Of course smart people disregard the order, generally but once, however, as some passerby is very liable to put a pistol shot through the window a reminder of the law the infraction of which is liable to burn up the rest of the city.

The general opinion that the insurance companies were the biggest losers by the San Francisco fire is erroneous. They are to advance rates—will make insurers all over the country pay it. Now if they would even up things by distributing the millions of dollars in premiums they have taken from San Francisco among the insurers whom they propose shall pay the losses, there would be some fairness to it. Otherwise a Federal law is needed to discourage this kind of stealing.

In Multnomah county—both men are resident of Portland—Coke beat Bourne 2005 out of 7375 votes for United States senator, got 4720 to 2655 for Bourne. It is alleged that Bourne overcame this and won the fight by hiring a man or men whenever obtainable in each country precinct to ask the support of voters. Of course, there is nothing really wrong in that, still we may see how an unfit or wrong man might carry his party in such an election, neither candidate being the least known to the voter, who would naturally vote as the friend who had the candidate's money and was working for him solely on that account, might ask.
