Shave, 15 cents; hair cut, 25 cents; shave, 25 cents; shampoo, plain, 25 cents; shampoo, extra, 35 cents; set hair, 25 cents; beard trimming, 25 cents; face massage, 35 cents; head massage, 35 cents; razor shaving, 30 cents; tonics, 10 cents; neck shaving, 15 cents; one or both of the latter two may be given free when the bill reaches 25 cents or over; shaving on holidays, 10 cents extra; shaving outside of shop, 50 cents.

The regular hours of opening shall be 7:30; closing at 8, except on Saturday, when the closing hour is changed to 10 p. m. Close shop at noon on the following holidays: New Year, Fourth of July, Thanksgiving and Christmas; on Decoration day opening hours between 10 a. m. and 3 p. m.

INSURANCE RATES HAVE ADVANCED

Board of Underwriters Say That Eugene's Business Buildings Are Defectively Wired

It will be remembered that a few months ago a representative of the Board of Fire Underwriters of the Pacific Coast was in Eugene and announced that nearly all the business buildings were defectively wired and were not up to the code. An effort was made by a number of owners to have the wiring done right, while others did nothing to change the condition of affairs. Now comes the information that insurance rates have been advanced on account of defective wiring. The average increase is 50 cents on the \$100. This announcement has created quite a stir among the property owners and no doubt steps will be once taken to remedy matters so that the rates will be lowered again.

MAN KILLED BY AN S. P. FREIGHT TRAIN

John Phelan, Bridge Carpenter, Loses His Life Near Harrisburg.

Had Been Drinking Heavily and Fell Asleep on the Track—His Skull Was Crushed—Died Later at Junction.

Junction City, April 31.—John Phelan, a bridge carpenter for the S. P. Co., was killed by a freight engine at the curve leading onto the bridge crossing the Willamette last night. He had been at Harrisburg, where he had been drinking, and had started for his camp, but was so drunk he sat down on the track and it is supposed went to sleep. The freight train came along just ahead of the Eugene local, and as it rounded the curve the man was noticed sitting on the rail. The engineer blew the whistle several times and put on the air brakes, but before the train could be stopped it struck the man in the back of the head, crushing his skull. The train was stopped and he was picked up and placed in the ambulance and brought here. He died as the train reached the depot. He was a single man and left one sister, residing in New York.

An inquest was held this morning over the remains and the verdict was that he came to his death while drunk and asleep on the railroad track.

ANOTHER PIONEER TAKES HIS LAST JOURNEY

Samuel R. Slayton Dies in Portland April 27 From Effects of an Operation

Samuel R. Slayton died at the hospital in Portland, Oregon, April 27, 1909, from the effects of an operation and a complication of kidney troubles.

He was born August 27, 1830, at Woodstock, Me. He crossed the plains in 1852 with an ox team to California. He moved to Linn county, Oregon, where he took a claim of 160 acres and engaged in farming and stock raising, occasionally going to the mines in Southern Oregon and digging for gold. In 1854 he moved to Umpqua county, Oregon, and engaged in farming. He served as a volunteer in the Rogue River Indian war of 1855-56.

He was married to Eliza J. Savary July 1, 1858, in Green valley, near Oakland, Or. He moved from the Umpqua to Polk county, then to Washington county, and in 1869 to Crook county, where he located on a farm within three miles of Prineville, and engaged in stock raising. There he had 800 acres of fine farming land. He was engaged there in farm and stock raising until a few years ago, and his wife were moving to Eugene over the Santiam route across the mountains, when the team was frightened by the falling of a tree, backed over a steep embankment, upset the wagon and injured Mrs. Slayton so she died in a few days.

Mr. Slayton had been living with his daughter, Mrs. Jennie O'Brien on West Ninth street, where they built a nice residence last summer. He leaves two sons and two daughters, and several grandchildren to mourn his loss. Mr. Slayton was one of the noble pioneers of Oregon, honest, true and brave, a good citizen, a kind neighbor, a loving husband and father.
