All right, we suppose, so long as the new husband thinks it all right. Still, not a few men would be suspicious—would doubt if it were all friendship.

Occasionally it happens the other way. Sherman Webber has been granted a divorce at Portland from Annie Webber on his complaint that she would remain away from home for weeks at a time frequenting saloons with men. A three-year-old child being involved in the divorce proceedings leads paths to what otherwise would seem a cold-blooded business proposition.
