It's not slang to say that when a San Francisco man wants money he just goes out and digs.

A street railway and interurban line to Springfield would give Eugene the appearance and life of a real city. It's worth pulling together for.

The extent of the San Francisco disaster may be somewhat realized by a Red Cross report that 200,000 people were fed by charity May 1. The fire commenced the evening of April 18.

The Drain Normal School seems to be a nestor for statesmen—or maybe only for politicians. W. C. Hawley, Republican candidate for congress, and Frank Benson, candidate for secretary of state, were formerly at the head of the institution.

These steel structures so far proposed for the burned San Francisco district will look very handsome for awhile. But all the summer is ahead, and an army of men will soon be at work there recovering the ground with other structures.

There is no excuse for life men in the Northwest, the building of the consolidated Great Northern and Northern Pacific railroad line down the north bank of the Columbia from Kennewick to Portland, 226 miles, itself requiring thousands. It is hoped to have 5000 men at work there this summer.

When Commissioner Gordon's report was published in Wall Street Standard Oil stock went up like a rocket. A concern managed by such shrewd men as the Rockefeller crowd are officially shown to be naturally excited by the admiration of the stock speculators. They all want to be in with the gang.

Here is something to think about, clipped from the Pendleton Tribune: "Walla Walla was a dead town until it paved its streets, now Walla Walla has doubled its population since that time. Pendleton might do the same." Boise, Idaho, also dates her wonderful prosperity from the time of laying the first permanent street pavements.

About the middle of this month thirty "backaroes" will begin the work of rounding up 6000 to 7000 range horses on both sides of the upper Yakima river back to the Cascade mountains. There will be plenty of excitement there running down, hauling and branding the fleet untamed horses that till that time will have known no rope or control.

The San Francisco earthquake settled the controversy over the underground trolley for streetcars. Those that were in operation were damaged to the extent that they would practically have to be rebuilt at a loss of a year's time and at a cost of millions. The underground conduit will be abandoned and the overhead trolley substituted.

The Merchants' Protective Association looking good work in the way of building up Eugene. Live commercial organizations are always a potent factor in city building, and Eugene seems to be especially fortunate in this regard. Interest in local manufacturing concerns, the coal deposits that are being developed in this county, our milling and lumber interests—all these things are being encouraged by the association and good results are certain to follow. Cities do not grow up; they are built up by the energy and enterprise of those who live

in them, and once this truth become firmly rooted among the businessmen and real estate owners it tends to unite them in earnest, disinterested efforts for the common weal.
