His Business Record

Hon. J. D. Matlock, candidate for state treasurer, has special claims upon the people of Lane county, now that he comes before them as a candidate for their suffrage. In 1897 Mr. Matlock was doing a successful large mercantile business at the corner of Eighth and Willamette streets, in this city. He had made considerable money here, but in the financial crash of 1896 lost the greater part of it. He had been doing a large credit business and the alternative presented itself of forcing those who owed him to pay or going out of business himself. Those who were indebted to him could not pay without great sacrifice of property, and some of them being poor, it would have meant sundering to their families.

Mr. Matlock reasoned that he could live without forcing the collection of money due him by closing out his business and selling real estate to pay his debts, or could continue business by compelling payment from those who owed him. This last course would make some enemies and distress many worthy poor people, and it was here that the superior qualities of Mr. Matlock's character showed uppermost; his sympathy was with those who toil, those who were unfortunate in their efforts to accumulate property, and he could not take a course to protect himself at the expense of those who were struggling to support families. He accordingly closed out his business, went to Alaska to start anew, and was successful in recouping his fortunes.

Mr. Matlock still holds more than \$20,000 of these old notes and accounts, but he has not enforced a collection or sued a man who owed him since his return from Alaska five years ago. A candidate whose record in business life is as clean as his is entitled to the heartiest support of his home county, and party lines should not be drawn in his case. No man is better qualified for the high and responsible position of state treasurer than J. D. Matlock, and if elected he will be true to every ante-election pledge he has made and give the people a square, honest administration of the office in all respects.

Governor Chamberlain has courteously granted Dr. Withycombe's request for a vacation in order that he may devote his time wholly to running for governor. Wouldn't it inspire more confidence if the state veterinarian would tender his resignation, so as to take the agricultural college out of politics? Hon. E. L. Smith, that grand old Republican statesman of Wood River, severed all political connections with the various state boards when he announced his candidacy for United States senator before the Republican primaries. That is the kind of action that inspires the admiration of the American people and furnishes an example that Dr. Withycombe would do well to emulate.

Oregon hopgrowers generally sold their crop last year's product about the nine cent mark. It is little comfort to them that with only a few stray lots in the hands of growers they are strong at twelve cents. That extra three cents a pound would mean at least two cents more profit to the growers if they could hold till now, allowing a cent a pound insurance, interest and savings. Taking the average crop at 33,000 pounds that would mean \$300,000 more to the growers. It is easy to grow hops, but

the veriest gamble to sell right. The selling or failure to sell has broke not only growers but men and syndicates counting their capital by the hundreds of thousands.

George Chamberlain has never failed to run strong in Portland, nor throughout the state for that matter. Dr. Withycombe very likely will prove weak there. As unpopular as ex-Governor Geer is supposed to be, the latter at the Portland primaries got 4085 votes to Withycombe's 2920. Look out for a veritable Chamberlain landslide in Portland election day.

Dr. Withycombe, Republican nominee for governor, is an Englishman by birth and 53 years old. He came to Oregon in 1871 at eighteen years of age, making him as good a citizen as anybody by this time. A course of study at Toronto in a veterinary college gave him the doctor title.

Eastern capital is seeking investment in Oregon not by millions but by tens of millions. The consolidation of Portland's power and electric companies the other day brought in \$20,000,000 in a lump.
