**Legal Relief Committee Will Make Shipment Wednesday—Donations Asked for**

The local San Francisco relief committee is preparing to ship another carload of provisions, clothing, etc., to the stricken city on Wednesday. The committee desires all those who have anything to donate to take it to Friendly's warehouse, where it will be properly cared for. If they haven't the time to deliver it, by calling on either Dr. L. L. Whitson, G. D. Linn or Dr. E. Yoran on the phone, it will be called for. Provisions, clothing and bedding will be accepted.

**FOR RAILROAD TO THE SIUSLAW BAY**

To the Editor: Now that several applications are before the council asking for franchises for operation of lines on the streets of Eugene, the occasion offers a favorable opportunity to secure the extension of the proposed line toward Siuslaw and eventually to tidewater, giving the people of Lane county an independent and shorter line to the deep sea. The eastern end of the county now has the main Southern Pacific line and four branches leading into the territory east of the main line, so that the western part of the county is fairly well provided with rail transportation, while the county has not a single mile of track on the west side of the main line. The result is the western part of the county is being neglected in development as compared with the eastern part. It is a strange and peculiar condition that on the line from the metropolis of the county to deep water the location is which a railroad would do the most good to the greatest number of our citizens, not a foot of railroad has been built. From this fact we may draw the lesson that Lane county people have made no concerted effort to help themselves, or even protect their own interests against the transportation monopoly that now smothered Lane county. With an independent road to Siuslaw Bay Eugene business men and Lane county consumers and manufacturers would be enabled to save themselves enormous sums. Even now, the total lumber shipments from the various mills in the county amount to approximately one million feet daily. Now that San Francisco and other California cities are to be rebuilt the Golden Gate metropolis will for many years be the best available market for Lane county lumber and the cheapest means of reaching that market is by way of Siuslaw Bay. Vessels are now carrying lumber from Siuslaw in loads of upwards of 200,000 feet and there is room enough in the bay to handle 100 such vessels daily, so that this harbor, without any additional improvements, can now handle at least sixty million feet of lumber daily, or sixty times as much as is now marketed in the whole of Lane county. The saving in freight would amount to at least two dollars per thousand feet, allowing for possible speculation it can be safely put at \$1 per thousand or one thousand dollars on each million feet, or one thousand dollars daily on the present output of Lane county mills. This is for one class of business alone. A proportionate reduction in freights may be expected on all other transportation that may possibly be affected by competition. Upon this showing I claim the city of Eugene should not grant any franchise for transportation except to such companies as will guarantee within a given time to construct and maintain an independent and competing railroad from Eugene to Siuslaw Bay.

**FESTIVE CIRCUS IS WITH US ONCE MORE**

**OREGON TEAM HAD CASE OF STAGE FRIGHT**

**And Let Willamette University Win Last Saturday's Ball Game**

**Boys From the Methodist Institution at Salem Excelled State University Lads at Every Stage of Game**

On Saturday afternoon at South Side Park there was an exhibition of what was slated to be a ball game between the Willamette University nine and the University of Oregon team, but when the game was over those fans present thought it was more of an exhibition to show up the foolish playing of the men. Oregon certainly had the stage fright, and had it badly. Nace started the trouble by reaching first on Johnson's error, and Rader followed suit on Hathaway's wild throw. Coleman belted a double to the tall grass and two runs crossed the rubber. The second inning was the same as the first, with honors to the third baseman for black marks. Beck allowed Long to get a present of three sacks at one grab, and on Hathaway's error he came home. Nothing happened again until the fourth chapter, when Beck was pounded unmercifully, allowing two men to skate across the rubber. In the next King reached home on Kelly's failure to connect with the sphere, he letting the ball slip through with the cadence of a greased pig. It was in this inning that Oregon put three runs over the pan and followed soon after by Hobbs' lone ace, which he turned into an earned run. Hurd, the southpaw, replaced Beck in the sixth verse of the heart-rending tale and showed off a trifle better after getting started.

In the eighth, Oregon added a tally on Salem's errors and Salem added some pretty playing from a spectacular point of view. They worked an excellent squeezed run on the varsity and stole bags at will. Another thing that should be mentioned was "Weary's" pretty catches in left garden, which brought cheers from the Hop Hous to the grandstand, but then when he missed one tears came to the eyes of the ladies present.

In the ninth Salem glued their lunch hooks onto Hurd's twisters for two whiffs, but the boy turned around and tossed two into striking at his flashes. Then Oregon got a run on Rader's wild throw into rosters' row, but the next ones up failed to connect for singles and so ended the lesson for the first game with the score:
