SUPERINTENDENT FIELDS AND OTHER OFFICIALS HERE

No Change in the Running of Eugene Local Contemplated

Schedule of Trains to Be Routed Over New Branch Not Made Out--The Mohawk Valley Sawmills

Superintendent L. R. Fields, of the Southern Pacific lines in Oregon, accompanied by Roadmaster Bollons and Master Mechanic Younger and one or two other officials, arrived in Eugene in Mr. Field's private car, "California," this afternoon on an inspection tour. A trip to Springfield by vehicle is included in their itinerary. The car was set out on the siding here and the party will proceed on south in the morning.

Mr. Fields informed a Guard representative that no schedule for train to be routed over the Springfield-Benderson branch has not yet been made out. He also said that with the completion of the branch no change will be made in the running of the Eugene local. It has often been reported that this train will terminate at Springfield when the branch is completed.

THE MOHAWK SAWMILLS.

The Guard is informed that Southern Pacific engineers are now in the Mohawk country viewing out the routes for the proposed new sawmills to be located up there.

Superintendent Fields and other company officials have within the past few days viewed the sites for the mills and found them to be satisfactory. There is no doubt that at least two mills will be erected by the company along the Wendling branch.

DRY AND SUNSHINY WEATHER IN OREGON

Weekly Report Issued by the Oregon Section of the U. S. Weather Bureau

From the weekly bulletin of the Oregon section of the United States weather bureau:

GENERAL SUMMARY.

The past week was dry and warm. A few small showers occurred in the coast counties and also in the foothills of the Blue Mountains, but the amount of rainfall was inconsequential, and droughty conditions now prevail in all parts of the state.

The mornings, as a rule, were cool, with temperatures dangerously near the frost mark, but fortunately the dryness of the atmosphere prevented the frost from forming except in a very few localities, and in these places the frosts that occurred were too light to cause serious damage. The afternoons were warmer than usual, especially during the opening and closing days of the week. Gentle northwesterly winds prevailed during the entire week, except in the Columbia river valley, where they were disagreeably high on one or two days, but not sufficiently high to be destructive.

COAST DISTRICT.

Doraville, Columbia county.—The weather during the past week was warm and pleasant, with no rain. There was a light frost Saturday morning. The prevailing direction of the wind was from the northwest.

Bay City, Tillamook county.—The week was generally cloudy and quite cool, with one or two light showers near the latter part. The winds were mostly from the northwest.

Toledo, Lane county.—Considerable fog prevailed at night and during the early morning, but the days throughout the week were generally clear and pleasant, with cool, northerly winds.

WILLAMETTE VALLEY.

Portland, Multnomah county.—The past week has been clear, with cool mornings and warm afternoons. No rain fell and the winds were generally light and from the northwest.

Forest Grove, Washington county.—The weather during the week was warm and clear, with no rain.

Corvallis, Benton county.—Ideal spring weather prevailed throughout the week, with a nice sea breeze every afternoon. No frosts occurred, and the winds were generally light.

SOUTHERN OREGON.

Peabody, Douglas county.—The weather during the week was dry and sunny, excepting Tuesday and Wednesday, which were somewhat cloudy. The nights were cool as a rule, but the days were warm and pleasant.
