DEATH OF A FORMER LANE COUNTY RESIDENT

James Baker, Pioneer, Dies at Burns, Harney County, of Paralysis

James Baker, an Oregon pioneer and former Lane county resident, died at the home of Martha Baker at Burns, Harney county, April 27, of paralysis. He was aged 73 years and was unmarried. He had been a high-respected citizen of Burns for a number of years. The deceased came to Oregon from Illinois in 1882. After residing in Lane county for a number of years he removed to the Eastern Oregon country, where he resided till his death. He was a brother of E. D. Baker, of Burns, and Mrs. M. T. Sawyer, of Eugene, they being the only surviving members of the family. The funeral was held on April 28 at the remains interred in the Burns cemetery.

First Trip to Champion Mine With Mail Wagon--D. & S. E. Extension

The Oregon Securities Co. has a full crew now at work on the Musick and expects to commence to haul ore from that mine to the Champion mill within a few weeks for treatment. A good force of men is steadily at work in the Champion.

The O. & S. E. extension has been completed to directly opposite Ben Pitcher's place, and for some little distance above there the trees have been felled and the work of establishing a grade is being carried on. It is expected to keep the force at work all summer.

Geo. Kerr on Monday made his first trip clear to the Champion mine with the mail wagon. Heretofore he has stopped below and packed the mail up on his back, but on Monday made it clear through. He says the snow is all gone except from the north side of the hills and that the road is getting very much better daily.

That earthquake hurt more people than the hundreds of thousands of San Francisco—any other thousands depended upon them for a market.

Eight inches of snow fell throughout Central Wisconsin Tuesday. That ought to make people feel like leaving there.

Dr. John Quackenbush, professor of psychology at Columbia University, and also member of the London Society for Psychical Research, in relating his latest experiments in hypnotic science before a large audience in New York, announced that he has discovered that suggestions given as death actually impends have a power absolutely unparalleled in any other mental state. Dr. Quackenbush said that a suggestion from himself saved the life of a young lady dying from pneumonia last June. Her condition was an equivalent to a death sentence, namely, a temperature of 107½, pulse 160, respiration 60. The attending physicians had withdrawn from the case. Dr. Quackenbush said that he took one of the lady's hands, called her by name and commanded her not to die. After working over her a few minutes the patient's mental mist cleared away. She talked coherently, and finally recovered. Dr. Quackenbush declared that two other patients had been saved from death by the medical man shouting a command in the ear at the moment of dissolution.

Dr. Quackenbush asserted that such methods would be effective in many cases of drowning, poisoning and shock.
