Guarding School Fund

The Salem Statesman, the leading Republican paper of Western Oregon, gives many reasons for the re-election of Governor Chamberlain. Here are a few of them, taken from yesterday's issue of that paper:

Thirty-three thousand acres of government land have been selected to satisfy losses in the school sections due the state. All of which have been sold, netting the school fund about \$190,000.

Forged applications covering hundreds of thousands of acres of school land brought to light, guilty parties convicted and certificates cancelled. Forged certificates and other documents covering thousands of acres of state land discovered in time to prevent complications which would have arisen had deeds been issued to the holders thereof.

Is not the above good evidence that Governor Chamberlain is looking after the interests of the school fund?

Both political parties in this state seem to have put forward their best man for supreme judge this year. Judge Thomas Halley, the present incumbent, is a young man of splendid education and ability, clean in his private and public life, while his Republican opponent, Judge Eakin, stands high in the estimation of the people of his district, alike for his integrity of character and high legal attainments. It is gratifying to know that in event of the election of either of these candidates, the people will be assured that the high standing of the supreme court will be preserved and its personnel made up from the best material in the state.

Registration books close May 15. There is a misunderstanding on the part of some who voted blank A at the primary election that they are legally registered. Such is not the case and does not constitute an official registration, and their names will not appear on the books, although in some instances they have been written in the books by the clerks of election. All such will have to register in the manner prescribed by law before notaries or justices in their respective precincts, or at the county clerk's office, otherwise they will be required to use the blank A at the general election.

The Kansas City mayor, W. W. Rose, ejected from office on account of failure to enforce the prohibition law, was re-elected on that issue. The same thing has happened in not a few other instances where women were allowed to vote that the woman vote was about equally divided on the question, in this case it being alleged that of the 4300 votes cast by women over 2800 went to the recalcitrant mayor. They voted about as their husbands or closest male friends voted is the size of it.

Somehow Senator Gearin gets practically all the requests at Washington from citizens of Oregon asking favors or information at the hands of several departments, principally that which has to do with public lands, of course. A young man, as senators go, Senator Gearin could be well kept at Washington. The voters will have the opportunity election day to vote to retain Senator Gearin.

Candidate Withycombe is solemnly promising to do a great many good things, if elected, that Governor Chamberlain has been doing for the past four years.

Sau Francisco, from being furnished with the essentials of life, is already furnishing other places, a shipment of fifty tons of new potatoes having just been made north.

It is impossible to down that man Geer. So far this campaign his mouth is working overtime spouting for Withycombe—and making votes for Chamberlain.

The Guard places the Central Point Herald on its exchange list. It is a neat little weekly paper just started by J. E. Lanchester and S. A. Pattison.

The drug trust laughs at the proposed prosecution and investigation. So did the life insurance companies once upon a time.

Note and Comment

We can't conceive how it would help a single Lane county man a cent to elect the Portland man state treasurer. On the other hand Mr. Matlock, if elected, would take his help from Lane county. Lane county depositors would be remembered where they are not now—Portland banks handling the state funds—while the money received from salaries would come to Lane county. As long as the big fellows are out for the money that is in it, why not the interested voter?

Mr. Withycombe says "the direct primary law has come to stay." Of course he could not speak ill of the means by which he got the nomination. We wonder, though, if he ever thinks how close the race was between himself and ex-Governor Geer—the latter with a badly smirched and fraud administration to carry, too. Then is it not probable that practically all those Geer Republican votes will be Chamberlain votes the 4th of June, having voted for Geer in the primaries with the idea that they would get the weakest man in nomination?
