The Plea of Partisanship

Much of the stuff printed in the partisan press of the country during a campaign is ridiculous when one knows the real facts. For instance, an Oregonian dispatch from Eugene tells about an enthusiastic rally of Republicans on Staudard, at which it was decided to "vote it straight," conveying the impression that this was a practically unanimous decision of Lane county Republicans. The real facts are that by actual count twenty-eight voters were present, including ten candidates and several Democrats, and the enthusiasm was fairly proportionate to the size of the crowd. By the way, this "vote it straight" campaign of the Republican managers is already renegeting because it is taken by the independent thinker and voter as a confession of weakness—implying that the ticket bears the name of weak candidates whose only hope lies in the size of party majority and the ability of the machine bosses to whip the rank and file into line. Besides, the voters realize that there are no longer any great issues dividing the two great parties and that it is now largely a question of selecting the best men to fill the offices. The president's cabinet, Knox in Pennsylvania and Taft in Ohio, set the example of non-partisanship by throwing their influence for the Democratic candidates in those great states, and Democratic governors elected in such states as Minnesota and Massachusetts show the independence of Republican voters. On the other hand, a couple of million of life-long Democrats voted for Roosevelt to put the seal of condemnation upon the corporation influences that forced the nomination of Judge Parker.

"Vote it straight" was the argument of the rings in Philadelphia and St. Louis, and their plundering of public funds continued as long as the people listened to the siren song that has ever been used by the politicians to deaden the righteous impulses of the honest partisan. It has been effective in times past, but to invoke its power now is to hark back to days fraught with prejudice and corruption. The people of Oregon are going to vote as intelligent individuals, not as the mere marionettes of political bosses—mark that prediction.

Earthquake Hurt Butter Market

A San Francisco dispatch says a peculiar situation prevails in the butter and egg trade. Prices are controlled absolutely by the local change, which is operating as a trust. The dealers combined at the time of the fire and depressed prices to aid in the relief work. Now that this work is on a smooth basis, the low prices are being maintained for speculative purposes. Large quantities of both butter and eggs are being stored.

At Portland, prices for country butter have steadily dropped from 16 cents before the earthquake to 12 cents, dealers being stocked up and able to use but a small portion of it locally.

Do you want a governor who is one of us, has taken enough interest in his country to fit himself as a citizen and has exercised the rights of a citizen where possible? How about Mr. Withycombe? He came to Oregon from England when still in his minority. How long was it do you think till he naturalized himself after coming to age? Politically we have never been able to see why because a party has a majority, be it big or little, that its organs or speakers should pound its voters on the back, figuratively speaking, to vote for an unfit man when there is a tried, competent man on the other ticket. Men don't do that way in business, in the conduct of their own affairs. Why should they be so strenuous in politics?

Robert L. Taylor, the man who campaigns with his fiddle, has carried the Democratic primaries of Tennessee for United States senator. Those who know the genial senator and have listened to one of his inimitable lectures, do not wonder that "Bob" Taylor is a favorite son of the state.

The announcement of the candidacy of Captain Richard Pearson Hobson for the presidency may in a manner explain the renewed efforts of many women to acquire the right to vote.
