This is an honor that is much coveted by the midshipmen in the academy and young Davis' hosts of friends here are gratified at his success in securing a place on the crew.

On May 4 the Annapolis crew defeated the crew from Yale in a two-mile race on the Severn. Davis occupied seventh position in his crew. His weight was given as 165 pounds, and height 5 feet 9 1/2 inches. The time made by the winning crew was 10 minutes and 45 seconds.
