A rate bill that Senator Aldrich endorses is not likely to work a hardship on the railroads.

Aldrich and his crowd of corporation senators seem to have won out on the railroad rate question after all.

Some several people about Liverpool, England, and Hartford, Connecticut, have been about as badly shaken up by the earthquake as San Francisco—at least it shook several million dollars out of their coffers.

Those electric road franchises appear to be the most important matter before the council at this time. The members should find time to consider them before the applicants get discouraged and withdraw their propositions.

It took Candidate Withycombe seventeen years after coming of age in this county to make up his mind to become a naturalized citizen. Probably the voters of Oregon will feel inclined to deliberate about as long before electing him governor.

The Rockefeller family should get together and compare notes in regard to their respected ancestor. Frank says his father is still alive in Dakota, and his brother, the oleaginous John D., says the old gentleman passed in his checks many years ago. In the meantime, who was Dr. Livingstone anyway?

The San Francisco earthquake and following fire destroyed some eighty churches and buildings devoted to religious activities. As it took several thousand saloons with numerous other places that are not classed as strictly moral resorts, the church people from that standpoint may consider themselves far gainers.

The local Commercial Club will have plenty of work to do if it succeeds in inducing the railroad company to grant such freight rates to manufacturers as will enable them to exist outside of Portland. If this cannot be done there must be a determined and consistent effort to secure competing lines that will afford the desired relief.

Secretary Loeb denies that President Roosevelt has expressed a wish to see Governor Chamberlain re-elected, but is careful to convey no desire for the success of his opponent. He merely says: "The president has not been asked to express and has not expressed any opinion of any kind or sort about the gubernatorial election in Oregon." Cold comfort in that message for Dr. Withycombe—to come from a Republican president.

P. H. D'Arcy, a Salem attorney, writes the Oregonian that Dr. Withycombe is the right man, that he will vote for him. Mr. D'Arcy should tell the whole truth—not that he loves Withycombe more, but Chamberlain less. Why should a man allow a personal matter to make such a fool of him as to rush into public print, thereby calling the attention of everybody to his pique? D'Arcy's contribution to the literature of the campaign will not cost Governor Chamberlain a vote.

The Oregonian proves conclusively by interviews with prominent Republican politicians that Jonathan Bourne Jr. must be elected United States senator next June or the state of Oregon will go to the Democratic bowwow, politically and otherwise. Strange to say, however, those interviews come only from Mr. Bourne's

old Populist guard—John C. Young, late chairman of the Populist state committee, and that other erratic flip-flopper, W. S. U'Ren, of Oregon, also a former pop leader. These pioneer Republicans were active in Bourne's \$50,000 campaign before the primaries and they were also in evidence when Mr. Bourne engineered that legislative holdup of a few years ago in which wine and women played a prominent part in the debauching of the recalcitrant legislators. In those days the Oregonian had a different opinion of Jonathan, having said of him editorially on May 26, 1896:

"Jonathan Bourne, a spectacular political hybrid, an avowed free silver flatist, a Populist wolf masquerading in a Republican sheep's clothing, a modern Esau, willing to sell his political birthright for a paltry office, a metamorphosed prodigal son, who has eaten the succulent corn and thrown the husks to the sound money Republicans."

San Francisco's insurance foots up about \$120,000,000. That is a pretty good-sized amount with which to commence rebuilding. Probably half of it will be spent for labor in and about the city. Figure out what that means. Allowing an average of \$2.50 a day for labor the sixty millions would employ twelve thousand men two thousand days, the working days of nearly seven years. It would steadily employ one hundred thousand men at \$2.50 a day 240 days, the working days of over nine months. The Bay City in its ashes is of course in greatest despair, but with the work of rebuilding the losses will be forgotten, at least not hold first place in their minds.
