Vitality of Disease Germs

Napoleon sought to inspire his soldiers in Egypt with the exhortation that from the pyramids forty centuries looked down upon them. Dr. Raphael Soynac, Frenchman, says that more than sentiment comes to us from the buried centuries of Egypt—consumption. Here is his statement of the case:

That the disinterred mummies started the spread of the tuberculosis germs in Egypt cannot be doubted. There are more tuberculosis germs in the almost impalpable dust around a mummy than in many caspids of effluvia. These germs live for thousands of years, as has easily been proven, and the exhumation of the bodies, even the well preserved ones, caused an epidemic of consumption among the workmen and scholars who first exhumed the bodies. It is also well known that the keepers of the mummy cases have been subject to the disease.

The start of tuberculosis in France in a serious sense may be traced to the great importation of mummies and mummy cases at the time of the Napoleonic invasion of Egypt, and this start gave the disease its first great foothold in Europe, whence it has spread all over the western world. Dead bodies may not secrete the germs, but dead bodies are undoubtedly a favorite lodging place for the tubercular bacilli.

The bacilli from the mummies are undoubtedly of great age, and it has been shown by experiments in Paris that these ancient bacilli are infinitely more deadly than those obtained from the sputum of live persons who are infected.

About the voting of Dr. Withycombe, candidate for governor, before he became a citizen of the United States, we have not the least desire to prejudice him—would give him the benefit of the doubt as to any wrongful intention. Here are the facts: Dr. Withycombe came with his father from England to Benton county, Oregon, a minor. The father announced his intention of becoming a citizen of the United States, but there is no record that his citizenship was ever perfected. Dr. Withycombe voted in 1876, 1880 and 1884 under belief, so he states, that his father's sworn intention to become a citizen conferred citizenship on his minor son and justified him in so voting. In 1888, having the candidacy for the state legislature from Benton county in view, and to remove any doubt as to his citizenship and eligibility to office, he took out naturalization papers, renouncing fealty to the queen of Great Britain.

The Oregonian pays the following high tribute to the conduct of affairs during the past four years by Governor Chamberlain, showing that the growth and prosperity of the state have been phenomenal. The Oregonian says:

Every citizen of Oregon must feel laudable pride in the material growth of the state in the past four years, as shown by the tabulated reports of the census bureau covering that period. Compared with the slow development in industrial and manufacturing lines during a period covering many years, this growth is almost phenomenal.
