Capitalists are beginning to find out that Eugene is on the map. There were several big financiers here today.

Mayor Wilkins should be unanimously sustained in his efforts to make the cleaning-up day a splendid success.

San Francisco is making preparations to get back into business. Two thousand carloads of goods are on the tracks awaiting the completion of temporary structures.

Aluminum sword scabbards are to supersede steel, iron and leather in the war department. They are much lighter than the other metal ones and more serviceable in every particular.

Very properly the new building regulations of San Francisco limit the height of buildings in accordance with the width of the streets. This very naturally will make property on wide streets the more valuable.

Eugene's commercial club would do well to devote some time and money to advertising the Blue River mining district. If these mines were situated in Colorado, Nevada or Idaho they would attract the attention of the whole country, while here in Oregon they are almost wholly overlooked.

Scattering property owners of residence property in Eugene are taking advantage of the provision of the city law that allows street curbing. T. G. Hendricks' improvements in that line are noticeable in that with a cement sidewalk he has put in a cement curb. It narrows the streets, but on residence streets there is still plenty of width left.

Soon Governor Chamberlain, like Grover Cleveland was once upon a time, may be loved for the enemies he has made. This thought is inspired by the letter of one Napoleon Davis in the Oregonian, wherein he intimates that he may not support the governor for re-election. Davis, it will be remembered, made a fortune as clerk of the state school land board in Penney's time, and—well, is it worth while to tell an old story over again?

The Oregonian's Washington correspondent says President Roosevelt called Democratic senators to his aid and sought their support on the railroad rate bill in order to force the recalcitrant Republican senators, and once having a safe majority on his own side, and looking to party advantage, threw his Democratic allies overboard. Shameful, despicable, will be the verdict of every honest man. No one under such circumstances will question the correspondent's statement that in Washington it is the common assertion of Democrats that "Roosevelt is a cheat and a liar."

Candidate Withycombe's brother John took out naturalization papers in February, 1880, and another brother, Thomas, in June, 1883. The candidate for governor, however, voted right along, though a subject of the queen of Great Britain, for the spring of 1888, when having a political bee in his bonnet—he desired to go to the legislature—he got naturalized too. Now he says he did not know it was necessary—though his father's taking out papers sufficed for him, a minor. It looks strange that with his brothers taking out papers he should not have realized the necessity of doing so himself. Under these admitted facts not a few will entertain the belief that Mr. Withycombe was care-

less about the matter for those thirteen years before he renounced the queen at the age of thirty-four, that he was just as willing to remain a subject of Great Britain as to become an American citizen.

Hon. J. D. Matlock, candidate for state treasurer, has always been and is now a consistent advocate of municipal ownership. While this has no direct bearing upon the office of state treasurer, it may be taken as an index of the political creed to which Mr. Matlock subscribes, having always been one of the plain people and not a corporation man and opposed to the monopolistic tendencies of the times. He furthermore believes in flat salaries for all state officers and does not desire to handle the state funds in the interest of some favorite bank as has been the custom in the past. These are some of the many reasons why Mr. Matlock should receive a rousing vote in Lane county, where he has lived so long and always stood so high among his fellow citizens.

Note and Comment

Robert Eakin visited Eugene, his old home, over Sunday. A struggling young lawyer here not so many years ago, he saw better opportunity in the newer, undeveloped Eastern Oregon, has gained deserved standing at the bar, service on the bench, and now stands fair to gain the highest judicial position in the gift of his fellow citizens—a seat on the supreme court bench. From a rather intimate personal acquaintance with Mr. Eakin, when he was in the first of his practice—had more time than clients—when he was in position to speak his full mind on ethical and political questions without fear of compromising himself, we cannot but think that he deserves all success that has come or may come to him.
