FOOT OF SNOW AT THE BLUE RIVER MINES

Fell Tuesday Night and During Wednesday of This Week

Fourteen or Fifteen Inches on the Summit--Operations at Great Northern and Lucky Bay Go Steadily on

W. S. Standish, of the Great Northern Development Co., arrived down from the Blue River mines on last night's stage. He informed a reporter this morning that a heavy snow fell at the mines Monday night and Tuesday, and when he left the Great Northern mine Tuesday it was a foot deep on the level. It was probably 14 or 15 inches deep on the summit. This is the first snow at the mines for several weeks, all the old snow having disappeared except in high altitudes where the sun seldom shines.

Mr. Standish says the Huntington quartz mill at the Great Northern is operating steadily night and day. They are now working in splendid ore and there is plenty of it. A raise from the upper to the lower tunnel, 120 feet deep, has recently been finished, affording a much better air circulation in both tunnels. Heretofore the ventilation has been bad and the air often became so foul that it was almost impossible for the miners to remain in the tunnels.

Mr. Standish reports the big plant at the Lucky Bay in steady operation. He says Wm. Robe, on the Everlasting Jack claim, has just completed a 300-foot crosscut tunnel and has cut the lead at a depth of 200 feet. A good body of ore has been found and a test run with a two stamp mill shows that it goes 20 a ton.
