"A Condition--Not a Theory"

The forced removal of the vinegar factory from Eugene to Portland because of high freight rates emphasizes the fact that it is imperative upon the people of the Willamette valley that they pull together to secure the building of independent electric or steam railways. This matter of prohibitive freight rates answers at once and beyond the power of successful contradiction the oft-asked question of why the Willamette valley develops so slowly as compared with less naturally favored sections of the Northwest. Here in the centre of a great fruit belt is the natural location for a vinegar plant, but discriminating railroad rates forces it to Portland, where there are competing railroads. In due time every other local enterprise of similar character must travel the same road, while our fruit-growers and farmers lose their markets and industries languish and die. This is the condition of the Willamette valley with the mask torn away--the bare facts set forth in cold type. It is not a pleasing situation to contemplate, but only good can come from viewing it because the people may thereby be roused to effort in their own behalf.

The city council is to meet tonight to consider the pending railway franchises. That some action should be taken toward securing an electric street railway with an extension to Springfield goes without saying. Nothing could be done that would tend more to the rapid development of Lane county, since the local line would no doubt prove a nucleus for an electric system that within a few years would extend possibly as far as the Blue River mines, and even to the Stenslaw river on the west. Constant extension, mile by mile, is the history of electric railway building, once a start is made, and there is no reason why a local system would be any exception to the rule. It is therefore a duty of the council to accept the best proposition that is submitted, after reasonable assurance of the good faith of those asking for the franchise.

"Farmer" Withycombe

In his speech at Salem Dr. Withycombe says that it was due to his efforts that the legislature was brought to realize the importance of having a state veterinary. The legislature of 1888 created the office, and--a few months after he was naturalized--Dr. Withycombe was appointed to fill the office.

Two years later he had the legislature raise his salary from \$1000 and expenses to \$1500 and expenses.

He resigned this position in 1888 to accept a position in the State Agricultural College, which he has held ever since.

The Agricultural College Bulletin shows him to be chairman of the committee on legislation. In 1903 the State Veterinary Board was created by the legislature and Dr. Withycombe became a member. In 1905 the legislature provided for the holding of farmer's institutes and \$2500 was appropriated for that purpose. Dr. Withycombe was selected to do the work and he has visited all parts of the state in the interest of his candidacy for the nomination for governor and his expenses were paid out of the farmer's institute fund, as will appear from the vouchers on file in the office of the secretary of state and he was at the same time on the Agricultural College payroll.

Dr. Withycombe poses as a farmer,

yet he has held public offices for 15 years. He was appointed veterinary surgeon for the state eleven months after he was naturalized and has held office continuously since that time.

The very fact that the Republican state committee is running a paid advertisement in its newspapers pleading with the members of the party to "vote it straight," is of itself suspicious. Why this unusual anxiety on the part of the machine managers to induce intelligent men to "shut their eyes, open their mouths" and swallow the dope fixed up for them without looking or tasting? Is the ticket unusually weak in places that they fear investigation and appeal to un-American prejudice alone to win their battle at the polls? Intelligence and high citizenship argue with the voter to think and act for himself, to go to the polls on election day imbued with the conception of duty and responsibility so aptly expressed by the good Quaker poet of a past generation:

"The proudest now is but my peer,
The highest not more high;
Today of all the weary year
A king of men am I."
