Dr. Wythecombe's Citizenship

The Oregonian is greatly exercised over the revelation of Candidate Wythecombe's waiting till he was thirty-four years of age to forswear his English fealty to the queen of Great Britain. Why? It knows the Englishman's retention of his citizenship is proverbial—that there are not a few but many instances right here in Oregon where men of English nativity have never severed the political ties of the mother country. They came here English, they remain English in thought and patriotic sentiment.

Why? England's care, defense of the individual citizen is proverbial—wherever scattered, in whatever part of the world, a wrong to a British subject calls for prompt inquiry and satisfaction. Failing the latter, in case of an inferior, a shot from a warship may be expected, while all the diplomatic machinery of the government is set in motion to secure prompt recognition from an equal power. Her world-wide possessions, commerce, have made such action a necessity, it has become a part of the national being.

But Dr. Wythecombe, nor his chief supporter, the Oregonian, cannot excite the sympathy of our Irish, German, Scandinavian or other citizens of foreign birth by its pretended indignation. Those people know better, do different—become citizens on the first opportunity. There is a considerable Irish vote in Oregon, there is where the shoe pinches. How has England governed Ireland? Figures do not lie, and in so far as they relate to Ireland are pitiful, most pitiful. Over a century ago, in 1803, Ireland had a population of 5,356,591. How many in 1901, the last census year, guess you? Ten million, twenty million? You must guess the other way, on the descending scale. She had 4,456,546 in 1901, a decrease of nearly a million in the almost a hundred years. No wonder Dr. Wythecombe, candidate for governor of Oregon, wants it understood that he cut loose his English ties at a very early date on his arrival in this country.

"Made in Oregon"

Eugene will make a good showing at the "Made in Oregon" fair, and it is to be hoped that the enterprise of our local manufacturers will be rewarded at least indirectly by an increase in business. What permanent good such an exhibition will accomplish depends largely upon the attitude taken by Portland business men, who hold the key to the development of Oregon, owing to the commanding position in the state of that city. They must rise above the narrow selfishness which seems to have characterized their actions in the past and come out boldly, not for a greater Portland, but for a greater Oregon. The people of the state have an interest in the growth and welfare of the metropolis that has been shown by the splendid support given the Lewis and Clark exposition, the present "Made in Oregon" fair and upon other occasions and they desire that Portland in return co-operate with them for the upbuilding of other sections and the development of those resources that must be relied upon to make a great and wealthy commonwealth.

If, however, Portland commercial bodies refuse to throw their influence in favor of liberal railroad rates to help the struggling industries of Eugene, Albany and other cities of Western Oregon, and decline in any way to build their prosperity upon the

prosperity of the entire state, then a spirit of resentment will gradually grow up against the larger city that will be a stumbling block to all participants, in the mutual dislike and feud. Portland will soon gain another factory at the expense of Eugene, owing to discriminating freight rates—will Portland's Chamber of Commerce show the right spirit by protesting to the railroad against this blow to the industries of the Willamette valley? Now, during the interest manifested by the "Made in Oregon" fair, would be a good time for the metropolis to show what stand it is to take in the promotion of good feeling and state fellowship.

Lane county should give Hon. J. D. Matlock a rousing vote. He has been identified with the business growth and development of this section of Oregon for many years and his record of citizenship is clean and upright. Local pride in a fellow resident whose sterling worth has been recognized by a leading political party, if nothing else, should rally to such a man a support not hedged about by party lines. Bear in mind on June 4 that Mr. Matlock is Lane county's only state candidate and that he is worthy of your vote for an office that calls for just the qualifications that he possesses in a marked degree.

A submarine boat with a speed of twenty-two knots an hour is reported as being offered to the government. The building of the Naton-Ontario-Klamath Falls railroad will make Eugene one of the most important railroad junctions in the West. If you stop to think, that means that there will be the biggest city in Oregon here, outside of Portland. And then there are many other good reasons for faith in Eugene's future.

If the senators and President Roosevelt continue to increase the violence of their denunciatory epithets for a few days longer the Congressional Record will not be a fit publication to circulate through the mails.
