Trip Into Arctic Ocean

A Winnipeg, Manitoba, dispatch of May 18 says Chief Factor Anderson, of the Hudson Bay posts, in the Mackenzie river district, left last evening on a long journey to the Arctic Circle. The interesting part of his mission is the conveyance to imprisoned whalers, whose homes are in San Francisco, the news of the terrible catastrophe which befell San Francisco.

These men are 300 in number and are in six whaling steamers. They have been there two years, imprisoned in the ice, unable to get through the passage, owing to the severity of the seasons. The Canadian mounted police from Dawson City, on their annual trip last summer, visited the imprisoned men. Since then no news from the outside world has reached them, and it is not known what epidemics have struck them, as at the time of the police visit scurvy was threatened.

Chief Factor Anderson has taken up six complete files of local newspapers containing a running story of the terrible visitation. From Edmonton he goes 2100 miles by canoe and portage to Fort Peel, on the Mackenzie river, from there it is 250 miles in the Arctic Circle to Herschel Island, where the imprisoned men are. From there Eskimos and Catholic missionaries will be employed to take the welcome newspapers and medical supplies. He will not reach his destination till some time in August, some four months after the disaster the news of which will bring sorrow to not a few of the men.

Brother Hawley is having a hard time campaigning for congress. Anti-prohibitionist Republicans do not take kindly to him, and now some of the ministers of the gospel are indignant because he denies ever having been one of them. The moral seems to be that mixing politics and religion is some like mixing whisky and water—it spoils them both.

There will probably be more haste in rebuilding San Francisco when the free rations are cut off.

Withycombe Case Fairly Stated

Portland Daily Journal.
James Withycombe, candidate for governor, has never been assailed by the Journal, either directly or indirectly, on account of the fact that he is not a native born citizen of the United States.

There has never been a hint nor a suggestion that he is less worthy to be governor of Oregon because his birthplace was in England and not in the United States.

The sole criticism made by the Journal—and it is a just criticism—is that for seventeen years after coming to Oregon James Withycombe remained an alien, and not until he became ambitious to hold public office did he forswear allegiance to Great Britain and become an American citizen. This is the charge against him, not that he is of foreign birth.

Mr. Withycombe's answer to excuse his extraordinary delay in becoming naturalized by saying that he supposed it unnecessary, imagining that he had become a citizen because his father

had declared his intention of so doing. Any man with the most rudimentary knowledge of the laws relating to citizenship would have known that the father's mere declaration of an intention which might never be carried to consummation could not by any possibility make a citizen of the son.

Other members of the Withycombe family realized this fact years before it seemed to have dawned upon James. His two brothers became naturalized respectively five and eight years before he finally saw the necessity of forswearing allegiance to the British flag and enrolling himself under the Stars and Stripes.

For seventeen years James Withycombe was a resident of Oregon without becoming a citizen. For thirteen years of this time he exercised the privileges of citizenship, although he had no legal right to do so. In 1888 he became ambitious to go to the legislature and then for the first time he took the trouble to look up the law and found that he was not a citizen.

A naturalized citizen, under our broad and liberal system of government, has the same right to seek state office as one who is native born. But an alien who comes to our land and who remains for seventeen years in gross ignorance of the laws of citizenship, becoming naturalized only when he wants to break into public office, may well be regarded with do it.
