## Why Bill Was Vetoed

Regarding the fertilizer bill of which Dr. Withycombe complains so much, Governor Chamberlain vetoed it for the reason it provided among other things that all manufacturers or persons, before selling, offering or exposing for sale in this state any kind of fertilizer, shall pay annually to the Agricultural College a license fee of \$20 for each and every brand of fertilizer. It provided that the director of the Agricultural Experiment Station at Corvallis (Dr. Withycombe, the Republican candidate for governor, holds this position) should seize and confiscate any and all such shipments and in order to collect the license thereon the local dealer who fails to procure a license as required by the act, or who fails to comply with the terms, is subject to arrest by Dr. Withycombe or his deputies or agents. It provided that money for licenses and fines be expended under the direction of the Agricultural College for salaries and expenses. Another salary—thereby giving Dr. Withycombe an additional salary.

One of the chief objections to the bill was that it made one of the educational institutions a factor in enforcing criminal laws. The bill made no provision for the filing of a report or in any manner showing how much money was received or expended by the director of the experiment station or any of his deputies. Governor Chamberlain further insisted that the enforcement of the criminal laws of Oregon and the duty which would devolve under the action upon Dr. Withycombe and his deputies, were those ordinarily performed by the sheriffs and constables of the several counties, and that he should not devote his time trying to perform those duties which should be performed by others. Governor Chamberlain was in favor and is in favor of a law regarding commercial fertilizers, but he is not in favor of a law giving power to any person to condemn fertilizers or any like commodity that gives the accused no opportunity to have his case passed upon by a court and jury.

A year ago the regents of the State Agricultural College at Corvallis discussed a resolution calling upon Mr. Withycombe to either quit politics or resign his position, and failed to pass it only upon that gentleman's solemn promise to attend to the work he was paid to do by the state. Now Mr. Withycombe is going over the state accusing the governor of various shortcomings while his own official duties are being neglected even worse than they were when the board called him down so hard. Apparently it remains for the people of Oregon to put him out of politics for all time next June.

Some of our state exchanges before and since the primaries, and some of them were Republican organs, have attacked Frank W. Benson, candidate for secretary of state on the Republican ticket, on the ground that he has been connected with the alleged state land frauds in this district. We think such statements are unwarranted, and do not believe that there is a cleaner, more competent candidate before the people at this time than Mr. Benson. He is especially well fitted for the office he aspires to and would make an excellent official if elected.

Governor Chamberlain has vetoed over Farnish, of Pendleton, by 21. Under all circumstances we cannot see wherein Withycombe has any particular advantage over Farnish as a vote getter, while four years of careful and conscientious work in the governor's office cannot but have greatly strengthened the governor. Many a voter going into the election booth without any decided preference between the two men will finally say to himself, "It is well to leave well enough alone," and will mark the cross before the name of George Chamberlain.

The morning paper says that Withycombe, if elected governor, will be a friend of the state university. But how about the Agricultural College at Corvallis—those people did not support him solidly in the Republican primaries without some definite purpose in view. From a wholesome pecuniary and selfish standpoint it would be a wiser course for the friends of the university in Eugene and Lane county to stand by a man like Chamberlain, who is not definitely tied up to a rival institution dependent upon state support for its maintenance.

Some of the Republican newspapers of Oregon seem to have started out in the campaign as supporters of Governor Chamberlain, but after being "seen" by the campaign managers switched to the other side. Now they are angry because Democratic papers are reprinting their praise of the governor, this being especially so of the Salem Statesman. And the worst of it is from their standpoint that the facts and figures they printed in support of the Chamberlain administration are true and they are now unable to refute them.

It looks like refinement of robbery—the Masons' and Builders' Association of San Francisco raising the scale of wages for bricklayers and bricklayers' helpers to \$7 and \$4 a day of eight hours. Their helpless victims must be content with the explanation that the rise is being made that sufficient labor in that line may be attracted to the city. Maybe it was not the monkey man descended from but the wolf, that if one is wounded and bleeding the others will eat him.

Clean-up day should be taken hold of in earnest by the people of Eugene and every lot and adjacent street and alley put in perfect trim. A thorough mowing of grass along the streets, as well as in the yards, would improve the general appearance of the city more than anything else that could be done.
