CHAMBERLAIN

WILL BE HERE

ON MAY 29

Lee M. Travis, chairman of the Democratic county central committee, yesterday received a telephone message from State Chairman Ryan stating that Governor Chamberlain will be in Eugene to address the voters on Tuesday, May 29. He will appear here in the afternoon of that day and at Cottage Grove in the evening. The governor was at first scheduled to speak in Eugene in the evening and at Cottage Grove in the afternoon, but Chairman Travis persuaded Chairman Ryan to reverse the dates.

MAY SHIP BRICK TO SAN FRANCISCO

A. W. Ream Getting His Plant in Readiness for the Season's Run

A. W. Ream will start up his brickyard near the cannery for the season's run in a few days. He is now waiting for a part of his machinery to arrive. It was shipped from Portland last Thursday and is expected here at any time. A 15-horsepower electric motor has just been installed at the yard to operate the brick machine. When the new machine is in operation the capacity of the plant will be about 25,000 brick per day. Mr. Ream informed a Guard reporter today that if he can arrange with the Southern Pacific company for a satisfactory freight rate he will ship a large amount of brick to San Francisco, probably several hundred thousand this season. There will be a splendid market for the brick in that city when the work of rebuilding the burned district is under way.
