SOIL IS NOW WELL SOAKED WITH RAIN

Report From Weather Bureau on Climatic Conditions in Oregon

Following is a portion of the report on Oregon climatic conditions for the week ending Monday, May 21, as given by the weather bureau at Portland:

GENERAL SUMMARY.

The week was showery and cool. The rains were heaviest in the western counties and lightest in the central and southern portions of the state. The soil is now well soaked nearly everywhere west of the Cascade Mountains and fairly well wetted in the northeastern counties. The temperatures during the fore part of the week were much below normal, and light frosts occurred on Wednesday and Thursday mornings. During the latter part of the week the temperatures were about normal. The sunshine was deficient, especially in the western counties. High winds occurred locally, but they were not destructive.

WILLAMETTE VALLEY.

Portland, Multnomah county.—The entire week was showery, with the temperatures during the fore part unusually low, and during the latter part reasonable. No frosts or severe winds occurred.

Aurora, Clackamas county.—The weather was cool and rainy during the week. The prevailing winds were from the southwest.

Corvallis, Benton county.—Showers occurred every day, with heavy rainfall during the fore part of the week.

A hail storm occurred at 3 p. m. on Tuesday. There were no frosts or high winds.

Drain, Douglas county.—Rainy weather prevailed during the week. The rainfall was heaviest during the fore part of the week, gradually becoming lighter as the week progressed. Southerly winds prevailed, which were, at times, quite severe.

Forest Grove, Washington county.—The weather during the week was cool and cloudy, with considerable rain.

HEAVY TRAVEL TO SPRINGFIELD

The eight o'clock stage to Springfield pulled out in four "sections" this morning, each vehicle carrying ten or more passengers. A good portion of them were bound for Marcola and Wendling to work in the sawmills. The stages which left later were also well filled.
