Reaction Against Bossism

The "vote it straight" movement of certain Republican managers, who imagined they were living in the dark ages of partisan bigotry and prejudice, has fallen flat. In fact, it has reacted, as most sensible persons supposed it would, and here in Lane county, for example, we have a more independent tendency than for years past. The anti-saloon Republicans have endorsed part of both county tickets and naturally the opponents of prohibition in the party are aligning themselves on the other side. This is as it should be. The liquor question is a live issue and as for the old party divisions they are almost entirely wiped out by the co-operation of the representatives of both parties in congress. All thinking men, who are not with the corporations and trusts, are advocating the same measures for public relief, irrespective of party, and a "Roosevelt Republican" and a "Bryan Democrat" are about as much alike as the different grades of oil that the Standard trust sold out of the same tank.

When the Republicans of Oregon were appealed to in the name of party to "vote it straight," it simply set them to thinking—and when voters get to thinking for themselves politicians are apt to have a bad spell. Their desperate efforts to throttle independent action has compassed their own undoing to the eternal benefit of the county and the state.

When they are actually operating cars on the Portland Salem electric road there will dawn a new era for Western Oregon. The road will not stop at the capital city; that would be contrary to all precedent in the history of electric road building, and especially so through such a country as the Willamette valley. It will come to Eugene, and most likely traverse the entire state from north to south, with feeder lines to the east and west. And all along the line we will see the big ranches cut up by progressive farmers, who will raise more on twenty acres than some are now on the old donation claim of 320 acres. More people of the progressive sort are needed in Oregon, and electric roads will bring them with a rush. That is why the city council of Eugene should help the movement along here by encouraging street and suburban electric roads, thus doing their part to hasten the day of commercial emancipation and the dawn of that development which is already long past due.

The Merchants' Protective Association is right in trying to keep all our factories here. If they are all to be moved to Portland because of high freight rates, the sooner these farcical "Made in Oregon" exhibitions are stopped the better. Railroad dividends are about all that has been made in Oregon in the past and at the present time there is nothing else that looks up quite so large when we think it over soberly. Eugene's tannery traveled the same road that the vinegar factory is to take, and—well, suppose the merchants ask Tom Richardson to discuss this problem in his address here.

At the meeting of the New York Civic Federation Monday night August 21st, I made an angry reply to the attack of Judge Gaynor upon the corporate greed of the day. Mr. Belmont is simply wasting his breath in defense of monopolistic robbery and in opposition to ultimate municipal

ownership of public utilities. The people are in earnest in these matters and are determined to look out for themselves in the future. Municipal ownership does not spell anarchy, or even socialism, but it may be defined as the determination of the plain people to hold for themselves the valuable right of supplying public necessities that has heretofore been given to private concerns who have abused their opportunities.

The Los Angeles correspondent of the Portland Timberman says that since the earthquake Los Angeles lumber dealers have not been able to get anything like the amount of lumber needed for daily consumption, not to mention the large trade as far east as Western Texas. It looks like the demand for Northwest timber for months to come will be limited only by the facilities of railroads to furnish transportation.

One young man on the legislative ticket who ought to get a good vote, irrespective of party, is Leon Edmondson. He is earnest, industrious and ambitious, just the sort of a man to work hard for his constituents in order to make a record for usefulness that will aid him in his future career. Young men of his stamp deserve the encouragement that an endorsement at the polls will carry with it.

Probably County Clerk Lee is worrying as little as anybody about the outcome of the election. He has made a good official and even Democrats are not likely to lose much sleep over the prospect of his re-election by his full party majority.

Salem is trying to secure all the brass bands in the state for her Fourth of July celebration. If the plan of the capital city is successful there will be some nice, quiet, "safe and sane" celebrations in the other towns.

California makers of redwood shingles have the very bad habit of putting but eight hundred in measurement into bundles that they sell for a thousand.
