Our Needed Rain

Some unreasoning people would have or splendid rain quit soon after coming. About, if not the only thing, hurt is the strawberry crop and that is but a drop in the bucket. Grain, hay, hops and gardens are profiting wonderfully—when the sun again shines you will almost see everything grow it will come so fast.

Then even with this good rain we are short of rainfall, considerably short. The report of the Portland weather bureau to May 25 gave the total precipitation since September 1, 1905, as 35.57 inches, the normal for that period being 43.43 inches, a deficiency of 7.86 inches, between a fifth and a sixth short.

This rain is adding to the snow on the summit of the Cascade range, thereby conserving the reserve summer supply of water for our streams and will temper the heat of summer as it comes to us in clouds and dew.

The telegraph company is making arrangements for handling 200,000 words a day of news matter from Caldwell during the trial of the Miners' Federation officials for the murder of ex-Governor Steunenberg. And when the public reads whole pages of stuff about it in Billy Hearst's yellow journals they will know less about the real facts in the case than they do now. It was the Examiner that backed up the miners, during the Cour d'Alene outrages, and pursued Governor Steunenberg as relentlessly and vindictively ever after as did the miners, who eventually murdered him in cold blood. Governor Gooding and the other officials who stand for law and order are being abused and misrepresented by the Hearst syndicate of newspapers at this time, just as Steunenberg was in his day, and the reports of the trial sent out from Idaho will be as far from the truth as was the Examiner news from Cour d'Alene.

There are no politics in the county commissioners' court—it is a straight matter of business—the membership thereof reach into our pockets, in a way, in determining county expenditures. Good business men put a check on their employees. Why should not the voters put a check on their county commissioners' court by electing one of the opposite party? S. M. Douglas, put up against present Commissioner Edwards, is a splendid man for the place, has good judgment, is active, ambitious. He makes a success of his own affairs and would give equal service in the county's affairs.

At least three important Oregon Democrats have publicly declared over their own signatures that they will not support Governor Chamberlain for re-election. They have not been fooled by the non-partisan humbug.—Oregonian.

Which merely tends to show that this election will not be decided along strict party lines. The three Democrats who have bolted Governor Chamberlain have as good reason for it as Binger Hermann or H. N. Williamson would have to refuse to support President Roosevelt.
