Governor George F. Chamberlain will address the voters of Lane county at Eugene next Tuesday evening, May 23, at the Eugene theatre. He will speak in the afternoon at Cottage Grove.

It was first arranged to speak in this city in the afternoon, but inability to secure a hall at night in Cottage Grove caused a change in the arrangements. The governor has had large meetings wherever he has spoken this year and it is expected that his meetings in Lane county will be no exception to the rule. He is a clear, forcible speaker and always instructs and entertains.
