Standard Oil Robbery

John D. Rockefeller has given a million dollars for the building of reformatories South and North. If Standard Oil, controlled by Rockefeller, would put the price of their products down to a fair profit on the cost of production, there would be fewer refractory youths to need reformatories. The ranks of vicious and wayward youths are mainly filled from the poor, upon whom the burden imposed by such arch robbers as Rockefeller rest the most heavily.

Socialism is just right in one thing—it would take God-given necessities of life out of the arbitrary possession of the comparatively few who by such possession levy tribute on the millions. The oil out of which such immense fortunes have been secured lies hidden in the recesses of the earth—why should it not be used for the advantage of all?
