S. J. JONES KILLED AT WENDLING

Struck in the Pit of Stomach By a Flying Slab Yesterday

He Was Working On the Lath Machine in the Booth-Kelly Saw-mill--His Life Was Insured For \$5000

S. J. Jones, employed at the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company's mill at Wendling, died about 11 o'clock last night from injuries received at 2:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Jones was working on the lath machine when in some manner a slab flew out and struck him in the pit of the stomach. He was taken home and lingered in agony till eleven o'clock at night, when he expired.

The unfortunate man was aged 40 years and leaves a wife and seven children. He had been working at the mill about seven months, going there from Sagaraw. He was a member of the Odd Fellows and Woodmen of the World, carrying insurance in the latter. It is said that he carried a total life insurance of \$5000.

The body will be taken to Cottage Grove for burial.

WOOLEN MILLS RUSHING BUSINESS

New Machinery Going in--Big Force to Run Night and Day by End of June

The Eugene woolen mills are getting in shape to greatly enlarge their output, some thirty tons of machinery having just arrived, the principal pieces being two spinners and a burr picker.

Forty people are now employed, but with the finishing of the new picker house and the placing of the machinery in order by the end of next month the mills will give employment to 100 people. The new machinery for the cards is expected to arrive in two or three days and then the mill will be run day and night.

The Eugene mill will then be a complete 6-sett mill, larger than the Salem mill and half that of Oregon City.

WORK ON BIG RAILROAD BRIDGE DELAYED AGAIN

The completion of the Southern Pacific Company's bridge across the Willamette river at Springfield is again delayed several weeks by the washing away of the falsework for a second time since the work began. The water yesterday was several feet over the partially completed center pier, but it sustained no damage.

S. P. CO. PURCHASES SPRECKLES ROAD

It is reported in Portland that the S. P. Co. has purchased the Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern railroad, in Coos county and extending from Marshfield to Myrtle Point, a distance of thirty miles. The price paid was \$1,000,000, and the former owners were A. B. Spreckles & Co., of San Francisco.

A section of the line—from Marshfield to Beaver Hill—will become a part of the Hartman road to be extended down the coast to meet the Santa Fe at Eureka. It is said there is an agreement between the Southern Pacific and the Santa Fe, that Hartman shall not build a coast line south of the northern boundary of California and Ripley shall not extend the Santa Fe north of that line.

THIS AFTERNOON'S BASEBALL GAME

The baseball game between the Springfield Blues and the Eugene Grays at the old league grounds this afternoon is well attended. The score at the end of the 5th inning was Eugene, 11; Springfield, 1.

The streets of Athena, Weston and Adams are flooded. All traffic is tied up and railroad bridges have been swept away. It will probably be a week before traffic is resumed. The water is still rising in the mountains.
